Telegraphic News.

A PITCH BATTLE. PITTSBURG, Nov. 30. A pitched battle between the Italians and the striking miners resulted in the Italians displaying white flag and the promise to leave to-morrow. Four of the Italians were killed. The police were on the spot in force.

LOUISIANA LOBBYISTS IN WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, Nov. 30. General Field is here for the purpose, it is said, of lobbying a joint resolution through Congress legitimizing the Kellogg rule in Louisiana.

Major Shelly is here ostensibly in the interest of the levees section of Supervisor Bean, of the De Soto parish, and is northward bound. He is registered at the tavern as N. Nelson Bean alias Falson claims.

There is a majority for the R-republicans in the Legislature, and chuckles over the ballot stuffing exploits in the various parts of the State. The object seems to be to renew the last election, by order of Congress, leaving that under which Kellogg holds sway intact.

THE PETERSBURG ELECTION CASE BEFORE THE U. S. CIRCUIT COURT. RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 30. In the United States Circuit Court today, Judges Bond and Hughes sitting. The Judges announced that they disagreed in the Petersburg election case, and would certify them up to the Supreme Court of the United States. Eight Judges and three Registrars of election in Petersburg were indicted under the enforcement act of Congress for obstructing and preventing colored men from voting at the municipal election in May last.

The counsel for defendants demanded to the indictment, and the points raised were elaborately argued. The Judges differ on but one point, viz: that none of the defendants charge that the persons prevented from voting were so prevented on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude. Judge Hughes holds and thinks this should be made in order to link in the proof of inference of motive. Judge Bond holds that a motive of race cannot be looked into, or proved, except by its acts, it is sufficient to charge that citizens of the United States were prevented from voting, and that the motive of hostility to race may be inferred from the act of preventing a colored voter from voting.

MISCELLANEOUS. NEW YORK, Nov. 30. The State Labor Union pledges assistance to the striking Longshoremen to the extent of \$10,000 or \$15,000.

Mayor Havemeyer died suddenly to-day aged 70 years. A particular friend of the Mayor, met a rep. impression on him, and it is said that he made melancholy remarks, both yesterday and to-day of uncertainty of life. The Mayor walked three miles against a strong wind.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 30. Two hundred and forty-two Menonites arrived on steamer Nederland, at present quartered in the steamship depot, at Christian Street wharf, where they are in charge of the Menonite Executive Aid Society, and will be forwarded to Sale Harbor, Lunenburg county, where they will be sheltered in about one hundred houses belonging to the Phoenix Iron Company. They will remain during the winter, and in meantime, locations for settlement will be selected in the Western States and Territories.

IMPORTANT DECISIONS OF THE SUPREME COURT. WASHINGTON, Nov. 30. The Supreme Court rendered the following decisions to-day.

Titus vs United States. Error to the Circuit Court for the Southern District of Georgia.

This was a proceeding by Titus to enforce his rights as an informer in respect to a land in Bibb county, Georgia, which had been conveyed by will to the Confederate States to aid the cause of the rebellion. It there held that as the land had already been conveyed by the property of the United States, and requires no legal process to make it such, no process could claim as an informer, in respect of it, and that the act of 1861, relating to informers was not intended to apply to private and not public property.

Such property as a fugitive as required under the laws of the war, a judicial sentence of condemnation to direct the title of its owner, and not such property of a hostile government as had already been captured by the army and subjected to the complete and undisputed ownership of the conquering power. Affirmed.

The Chief Justice delivered the opinion. Steamboat M'Elie M'lier et al., vs Home Insurance Company. Appeal from the Circuit Court for the Eastern District of Wisconsin.

This was the affirmation of a decree charging the officers of the steamer of a wrongful act in attempting to pass through the pier of a bridge near St. Paul, on the Mississippi river, navigating a river in M. J. 1869, in very rough weather, as her cargo of wheat was insured by the company, and was lost in consequence of the act. The decree was for the amount of insurance taken, and it is sustained here.

Mr. Chief Justice Davis delivered the opinion. Amblor vs. Walppee et al. Appeal from the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia.

This was the reversal of a decree below in a proceeding based on a partnership between the parties which was entered into for the purpose of perfecting an invention for generating a gas from petroleum, which could be utilized. The decree below found that by the dissipated conduct and neglect of business, Amblor had lost his rights under the contract of co-partnership, and was not entitled to share in the success of the invention. This Court can see nothing in the case

which deprives him of his rights, and reverses the decree. Mr. Justice Miller delivered the opinion.
