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General Assembly of North Carolina.

SENATE. Dec. 9th, 1874. President Armfield in the chair. Journal of yesterday read and approved. Mr. Speed, a petition from citizens of Granville asking prohibition of liquor within three miles of an academy in Oak Hill to wash. Referred.

On motion of Mr. Morehead, rules suspended, and bill establishing additional terms of Superior Court in Wayne county was put on its several readings. Passed. Mr. Williamson, bill to change time for holding Superior Courts in 7th Judicial District. Judiciary.

Mr. Kerr, bill amending Article of Constitution to read "county commissioners" instead of county canvassers. Referred. Mr. Selby, bill incorporating A & F. Masons into Mattamuskeet Lodge No. 288. Referred.

Colored Mr. Tucker, bill to give separate management to the white and colored militia of the State. Referred. Also a petition referred to same committee. Mr. Peebles, bill requiring all fire companies not incorporated in the State to make a deposit of securities with the Treasurer before getting license. Referred to Insurance.

Mr. Standford, resolution limiting speeches to 30 minutes. Lies over. Mr. Pegram, rules suspended, and bill for additional terms of Superior Court for Cumberland put upon its several readings. Passed.

Resolution memorializing Congress in behalf of New River Canal adopted. Bill requiring all sheriffs and constables to deliver all summonses under certain penalties passed 3rd reading. Senate concurred in joint resolution of committee of 3 from Senate and 5 from the House to be called the Centennial Committee, and arrange for any Centennial celebration in the State.

General sheriff and tax collector relief bill sent back from the House to Senate amended by going back to 70 and 71, in arrears of taxes, and extending time to these officers till January, 1877. Senate refused to concur. Bill concerning constables, giving them jurisdiction throughout the county. Passed.

Bill to prevent misapplication of State bonds, and making embezzlement punishable with 30 years imprisonment, passed 3rd reading. Mr. Latham informed the Senate that Senator Bell was very sick at his room. Mr. Lindsey's bill for protection of innocent women. This bill provoked much discussion. Some wanted to limit the action to six months after the slander was spoken, and others opposed the whole bill, because action did not hinge upon a complaint made by the woman injured.

Mr. Standford in advocating the bill said that since he had been here a pure and innocent woman had written him to bring action for her for a slander, but he had discovered that the defendant did not have one cent of property the woman could get at, and she had no father or brother to avenge the insult, and hence the necessity for making such slanders punishable by fine and imprisonment. Mr. Cook's amendment was adopted that the action shall be brought upon request in writing of the party injured and filed with the bill of indictment. Bill with this amendment passed 3rd reading. Senate adjourned till tomorrow at 11 o'clock.
