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General Assembly of North Carolina.

SENATE. December 19th, 1874. President Arnfield in the chair.

THE PUBLIC ROADS. A bill was passed yesterday repealing the bill which required magistrates in every township to make out written reports to the Superior Courts of the condition of the roads.

THE LANDLORDS LIEN BILL. A bill which passed its second reading the other day was on motion of Mr. Kerr postponed for its third reading to the 25th day of January.

THE DOME OF THE CAPITOL. Mr. McCuey from the Committee on Public Buildings reported that the dome of the Capitol is very much out of repair.

THE BILL FOR BENEFIT OF DISABLED SOLDIERS. This bill, Mr. Morehead's bill, is confined to disabled soldiers, and exempts them from certain licenses, such as for billiard saloons, bowling alleys, bagatelle tables, peddling tobacco and other things.

MR. RICHARDSON MOVED TO POSTPONE until January 18th, next, the resolution to amend the charter of Greensboro, was taken up and passed its several readings.

17. Picking knife over the glass - Will you be alone? - Exchange.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. December 15. Mr. Speaker Robinson called the House to order at 11 a. m.

Mr. Blythe presented a petition in regard to a local prohibition liquor law.

Mr. King, from the Committee on Enrolled Bills, Mr. McIver, from the Committee on Counties, Cities, &c., Mr. Finger, from the Committee on Enrolled Bills, and Mr. Walker, of Richmond, from the Judiciary Committee, submitted reports.

Mr. Foote, resolution in favor of H. M. Miller, Calendar.

Mr. Erwin, a resolution calling upon W. A. Smith, Receiver of the Western North Carolina Railroad, for a report concerning the finances of the road.

Mr. McRea, a bill to define what interest in real estate may be sold under execution. Referred.

Mr. Walker of Richmond, a bill to amend chapter 17, section 57, Battle's Revised, concerning parties to action to recover real estate.

The report of the Joint Select Committee on per diem and mileage, recommending that the present law remain in force, was read and adopted.

The bill to empower the commissioners of Pasquotank county to build school houses was taken up and failed to pass its second reading.

Mr. Means moved to reconsider the vote by which the bill in relation to building school houses in Pasquotank, failed to pass its second reading, and the motion prevailed. On motion of Mr. Means the bill was recommitted to the committee on education.

THE BULL IN REGARD TO THE LABORER'S AND MECHANIC'S LIEN LAW.

Hughes col. moved postpone until January 26.

The bill to provide for clerical aid, and traveling expenses for the Superintendent of Public Instruction was taken up, and, on motion of Mr. Eastman, was laid on the table.

On motion of Mr. Hurley, the Senate resolution in relation to repairs on the Capitol was taken up and passed its several readings.

The bill to fix the compensation of Supreme Court Judges holding special or extra terms was taken up.

On motion of Mr. McCubbins the bill to authorize the commissioners of Roanoke to subscribe \$100,000 to the capital stock of the Yadkin Railroad Company, and passed its second reading by a vote of yeas 81, nays 3.

The bill to extend the time for removing improvements off of the State lots in the city of Raleigh, was taken up and passed its several readings.

A resolution in favor of H. M. Miller was taken up and passed its several readings.

The bill to amend section 30, chapter 103, Battle's Revised, was taken up and laid over informally.

The motion to amend the charter of Greensboro, was taken up and passed its several readings.

On motion of Mr. Mendenhall the vote by which the resolution in relation to repairs on the roof and dome of the Capitol passed its third reading, was reconsidered.

Mr. Richardson moved to postpone until January 18th, next, the resolution to amend the charter of Greensboro, was taken up and passed its several readings.
