## SENATE.

FEBRUARY 24TH, 1875.

President Armfield in the chair.

Prayer by Rev. Dr. Pritchard.

Clerk read Journal of Saturday.

MR. PARISH AMBER.

In question of privilege on Bill introduced by Mr. Battle.

It had reported him as opposing the noisy law.

He would say that while the present bill was objectionable

in several respects, particularly as to its position, yet he had always favored a law restricting interest, and had favored

and supported the present bill notwithstanding his objection to some of its provisions.

MR. BROWN.

The evidence in this case was closed on yesterday with the understanding that only four out of the fourteen lawyers were to speak in the case.

Mr. Battle moved to adjourn.

Mr. Battle opened for the plaintiff, Lee, and will be replied to by Messrs. Smith and Fuller on behalf of the defendant, Dunn. The argument will be closed by Mr. C. Badger for the plaintiff.

The bill then passed second reading.

Adjourned.

THE LADIES.

The electrical girl: In the beginning of 1845, a year memorable in the history

of glass, a girl named Angelique Cottin was a girl of fourteen, living in the garden of Bouvigny, near La Perrière, department of Orne, France.

She was of low stature, but of robust frame, and athletic to an extraordinary degree both in body and in mind. On

January 15 of the year named, while the girl was, with three others, engaged in weaving silk thread gauze, the osman table at which they worked began to move and change position. The girl was brought to the curé's home, and there the phenomena were repeated, though not with the same intensity as before; the table retreated, but was not overturned, while the chair on which Angelique was seated moved in a contrary direction, rocking the while and giving Angelique great difficulty in keeping her seat. —From Popular Science Monthly for March.

EDUCATIONAL.

House bill to pay \$100 to Colonel S. D.

Pool for distributing 1,500 copies 12 months of the State Educational Journal,

15 to the schools and teachers, every month, in the different counties in the State as voted down. It was then to be considered and the bill amended to appropriate the \$700 out of the school fund.

It was adopted, May 20, 1875.

The bill passed third reading, and a registered bill is now good against subsequent purchase without notice of any outstanding debt.

Amendment of Mr. Mills was adopted, May 25, 1875.

Mr. Bell supported the bill. Mr. Armfield, to satisfy Mr. Kerr's objections, amended by consent, that the bill should not be good where the purchaser had purchased in the knowledge of the fact.

Mr. Biddle objected to the bill in that it related to old deeds.

He was for a moment suspended, but was soon resumed, and the bill was then to be referred to the old deeds.

Mr. Bell supported the bill.

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
