City Intelligence.

John W. Hays' daughter is extremely ill.

ZETA Psi in the Legislature.—A glorious old club was the Upsilon Chapter of the Zeta Psi Club in the days before the war at Chapel Hill. It was the Fall of '57 when the chapter first arrived, and what a big supper that night the boys sat down to! Finally was our burg man, not only a good talker but he boasted him the best man on his muscle at the Hill. Heigh! It all looks like a dream. But it isn't.
There are flesh and blood realities of that old club who are prominent before their constituencies in every State in the land. The chapter at Chapel Hill was granted from New Brunswick, New Jersey, and shortly afterwards a chapter was established at the University of Virginia. To-day in the House of Representatives are seated four members of the Zeta Psi club. The State will know the proud stand they have taken. There is Marshall H. Pinnix, of Davidson County, aged 24, and already confessed as among the foremost leaders in the House. Then Platt D. The man that is rushing the little town of Durham ahead, is also a Zeta, and is as true as steel to his grip.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

SENATE
March 10, 1875.
Prayer by Rev. Dr. Pritchard.
Clerk read journal of yesterday.
MRS. TUCKER'S CALL.
A convention was read as reported from the committee on constitutional reform. The bill was adopted as a substitute, and on motion of Mr. Morehead it was ordered to be printed immediately and made the special order for Friday at 12 m. This substitute is Mr. Cantwell's bill with some verbal amendments. A majority of committee recommended that the bill pass.
The names alleged by the complainant why this remedy should be given, is that the law amending the former charter of that city is unconstitutional.
"Because the districts into which the city is divided are largely unequal in proportion, though they have the same representation in the City Council, and that this is particularly true of the colored population, which, in the 3rd district, is, by itself, as large as the population of both the other districts."
2d, Because the amended charter prescribes other qualifications for voters than are prescribed for voters in the Constitution of the State, which are particularly oppressive to the colored people.
Whatever may be said of the propriety or impropriety of the Legislature in question, we are of opinion that the remedy sought for is not a proper one. There is no special wrong or irreparable damage alleged to be done or threatened to the complainant in person or property; but the injury threatened is stated to be the loss of great dignity and confusion, which would arise where there were two contending bodies claiming to be the Common Council, and to be entitled to the government of the city.
The remedy for this is the writ of quo warranto, brought by those out of possession of the office against those who hold it, and we know of no case where a Court of equity has interposed by injunction to prevent an election upon such general grounds of fear common to all citizens, even if the law under which it was about to be held was clearly unconstitutional. As is said by the Supreme Court of the State of Pennsylvania in Smith and McCarthy's 5th equity reports, "the power ought to be plain to authorize courts to forbid municipal elections when ordered by the Legislature," and we may add, that before they exercise it, they should be some threatened irreparable damage to the person or property of those who seek the remedy.
If this election be an illegal, unconstitutional one, the remedy by quo warranto is complete. It is a legal one and the complainant or any of the citizens are deprived of their rights under the 14th or 15th amendments of the Constitution of the United States, there is ample remedy in the courts by indictment and otherwise under the acts of May 30th, 1870, and February 28th, 1871, to punish the wrong done and to restore the rights of the parties.
We think the injunction must be refused.

FROM WASHINGTON.
WASHINGTON, March 9.—SENATE.
Wilson's absent.
Ferry received 89 and Thurman 25 votes for President pro tem.
The Standing Committee announced the following changes of Chairmen: Cushing, Commerce vice Chandler; Hamlin, Postoffice and Post Roads vice Ramsey; Agnew, Public Lands vice Sprague; Ingalls, Finance vice Pratt; Blinnock, Territories vice Sherman; West, Railroads vice Stewart; Sargent, Anna and Mining vice Hendon; Boutwell, Revision of Laws vice Cushing; Patterson, Education and Labor vice Plummer; Clayton, Civil Service and Retrenchment, vice Wright.
Two Committees were given Democrats: Finance, Private Land Claims, and Stevenson, Revolutionary Claims.
After the announcement of Committee Pinback was resumed. Morton continued his speech. After the conclusion, Merriam took the floor in opposition. Before concluding he yielded to an executive session.

FROM NEW HAMPSHIRE.
BOSTON, March 9.—Dispatches from New Hampshire up to this hour indicate an unusually large vote by each party, and a possible R. publican victory through the prohibition vote, which is very generally being cast for the Republican nominee. The Republicans already claim the Governor and the second and third Congressional Districts. The picking of Jones, dem., Congressional candidate in the first district is conceded by the R. publicans.

March 10, 1875.
At 10 a. m., Mr. Speaker Robinson called the House to order.

On motion of Mr. Means, the bill supplemental to the act to prevent fire attacks from running at large in Cabarrus and other counties was taken up and passed its several readings.
The bill concerning the inspection of timber in Wilmington was taken up, and passed second reading.
The bill to incorporate the Rutherford Manufacturing Company was taken up and passed its second reading. The bill came up on its third reading and was referred to the Judiciary Committee.
By Mr. Boyd, a resolution in favor of James Lumby and James Parrish, Calendered.
By Mr. Truxtun, a bill to incorporate the North Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia Narrow Gauge Railroad Company, referred.
By Mr. Walker, of Tyrone, a resolution to adjourn on the 23d inst.—Calendered.
The bill to define the jurisdiction of the Mayor of the town of Salisbury, was taken up and passed its several readings.
The bill for the relief of disabled soldiers was taken up and referred to the Finance Committee.
By Mr. South, a bill to restore the charter of the town of Beaufort. Referred.
The bill to authorize the commissioners of Cabarrus county to levy a special tax was taken up and passed its several readings.
On motion of Mr. Walker, of Tyrone, the resolution adjourning sine die on the 23d was taken up and adopted.
The bill to authorize the issue of the writs of certiorari was taken up and passed its several readings.
The omnibus liquor bill was taken up, amended and passed its several readings.
The bill to compromise, compromise and settle the State debt, was taken up.
Mr. Godger opposed the bill.
Mr. McRae supported the bill.
Mr. Boyd took the floor in opposition to the bill, but pending the conclusion of his remarks the House adjourned until 7 1/2 p. m.
