RECORD.—A bill has gone from the House

to the Senate incorporating the Norfolk,

Bathurst and Greensboro Railroad, to

run through sections of Granville,

Perrow, Caswell and Guilford counties.

The capital stock proposed is one million

dollars, and with our hundred thousand

dollars subscribed to since President

and vice president. It leaves to each of

the above named towns to vote "Rail-

road," or "No Railroad," or fifty thou-

sand dollars tax. The bill was introduced

by Mr. Ann Barnett, of Perrow.

THE WESTERN ROAD.—The Western

North Carolina road will be sold at auc-

tion sometime in May next and President

Armstrong of the Senate, and Speaker

Robinson of the House, and Gov. Brogden

have been appointed commissioners by

the Legislature to purchase the road for

the State, and then to let the intention

FULL TAX BILL.

That passed the other day, was on motion

of Mr. Standford, reconsidered, and

amended to give collectors 30 cents in-

stead of 25, was adopted, and bill again

passed third reading; aged 37, says 4.

Mr. Jenkins, bill to amend the charter

of the town of Kings Mountain. Referred.

Mr. Graham, bill to improve the laws

this State. Referred.

Mr. Caldwell, bill to prohibit liquor in

certain localities. Referred.

House bill, requiring all officers of a

county to make returns of all public

lands that come into their hands, passed

third reading.

EQUALIZING CHARGES IN FREIGHT.

Mr. Graham's bill came up on second

reading in regard to railroads, providing

for all charges for freight of same class in

the same direction for an equal distance

shall be the same. That the railroads

must forward all freight in three days

after its receipt unless otherwise agreed

with the shipper. The bill does not ap-

ply to freight coming from or beyond ter-

ritorial and road or to be carried through

or across the State. Discussion on the

bill was cut off by the occurring of the

Executive session.

ing.

The bill to authorize the commissioners

of Marion county to levy special tax,

passed third reading.

The bill to change the line between the

counties of Mitchell and Yancey, was

taken up and referred to the Committee

on Counties, Cities, &c.

The bill in relation to the Land Scrip

Fund, was taken up.

Mr. Morehead offered a substitute

which was adopted.

After a long debate the previous ques-

tion was called, and the bill failed to pass

second reading.

Mr. Norwood moved to reconsider.

A vote was taken and the motion to

reconsider prevailed, yeas 48, ays 47.
