Eighty-eight colored families comprising 537 persons will emigrate to Liberia from two of the counties in Alabama.

John Faulkner, model gentleman of Person county, died from overstrain in lifting logs, we learn from the Milton Chronicle. He was 47.

Governor Graham is in the city to-day. He rejoices at the action of the Senate yesterday in regard to convention. To have won the economy of well done from this pure man and honored statesman speaks a good day's work for the Senate.

The concert at the Asylum for mutes last night was a very pleasant affair. A large and fashionable audience greeted the occasion. The deaf mutes acted a farce on Congress, had the speaker and the pages, and the mutes got into a very exciting debate, the speaker finally hurling the gavel at them and all hands rushing from the stage in pell mell confusion.

LIVE AND WORK.—An old lady in this city derives her support from making tobacco bags. She cuts and sews them according to measurement, and with a big needle she strings the top with a heavy twine. The skin is now rubbed off one hand, and she has it in a rag, but still she works—and why shouldn't she? She gets a cent for every bag she makes.

LAW MAKER'S WIFE.—Yes, he's a clever fellow, and a better representative was never sent to the Legislature, but he regretted before a worthy lady that he wasn't able to buy a certain little pleasure for his wife, and the next evening the good dame heard he had hired a carriage and was taking some young ladies in this city out riding. The worthy dame immediately sprung her bonnet and told the community for six squares around all about it.

A BILL IMPORTANT TO SOLICITORS.—A bill has just become a law in this Legislature making the duty of the Solicitors of the several circuits to attend the federal courts and prosecute revenue officers and other officers of the United States who have been indicted in the state courts and have removed their causes into the Federal Court, under the act of Congress. The bill allows the solicitor a fee of \$20 for prosecuting each case, and allows him to procure some attorney to prosecute in his stead when he is unable to attend. The U. S. District Attorney having decided that in all such cases it was his duty to defend the defendants in the U. S. Courts as "Prosecuted officers of the Government," such cases have heretofore been dismissed without trial from the federal courts, for want of prosecution, and some of the worst offenders in the State have thus gone unwhipped of justice.

Dr. Roser has been holding a protracted meeting in the town of Wilson, and will preach there to-morrow (Sunday).—The village debating club at Rocky Mount are wrestling with the question, "Which man most cares for, women or money?"

SENATE. March 13, 1875.

Mr. Armfield in chair. Clerk read journal of yesterday.

Mr. Bell, bill in relation to changing gauge of railroads. Referred.

Mr. Standford offered a substitute for report of joint committee on affairs of A. L. Smith and Chesapeake Canal, appointing a committee of three citizens of Currituck county to make the investigation, which was adopted.

Mr. Love, bill to require certain statements of public receipts and disbursements of public monies. Referred.

U. R. authorizing commissioners of Haywood county to levy a special tax passed third reading.

Bill to protect fisheries passed third reading.

Bill to amend charter of Le Grange, Lenoir county, passed third reading.

Bill authorizing commissioners of Cherokee county to levy a special tax passed third reading.

Bill to incorporate town of Franklinville, county of Randolph, passed third reading.

Bill for more efficient prosecution in the criminal cases of the State. Passed third reading.

Bill to attach Watauga to 10th judicial district and change time of holding courts passed third reading.

Petition of citizens of Woodville, Bertie, concerning sale of liquor, with bill from Mr. Peebles to prohibit sale of liquor in that locality, was referred.

Breaking into an uninhabited house with intent of burglary was made a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment in jail or penitentiary.

Three lady witnesses who danced attendance at trial of J. Williams Thorne to testify in his defence were voted \$16 each.

Bill to lay off a public road from Horse Gap to the Virginia Line passed third reading.

Bill for farming out convicts passed third reading.

SQUALLING BOOTS. Mr. Cashwell, rep., offered the following resolution for the better government of this chamber: "Resolved, that the Sergeant at arms, known as former doorkeeper be requested to keep out all talking louder than a low whispering in the senate chamber; while in session, and that all persons wearing squalling boots or shoes shall not walk fast across the chamber while the house is in session."

Mr. Cashwell spoke in his resolution in very serious strain, giving his ideas of how to keep order in this chamber, when Mr. Cantwell: Will the Senator from Bladen allow me?

Mr. Cashwell: Yes.

Mr. Cantwell: Is the Senator a strict constructionist or a latitudinarian?

Mr. Cashwell looked like something had hit him, he folded his arms and replied, "I oppose," and continued his remarks on discipline.

Mr. Shaw amended, provided the Sergeant-at-arms shall not allow any Senator to go to sleep in his chair. (Laughter.) Mr. Cashwell: I know that means me; I had been travelling all night before, but Mr. President, I wasn't making any noise when I was asleep. The whole thing was laid on the table.

Substitute of Mr. Selby modifying the Pilot bill was accepted.

By action of the Senate the principal clerk is now styled secretary, and the principal doorkeeper sergeant-at-arms. Senate adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

At 10 o'clock, Mr. Speaker Robinson called the House to order.

The Journal of yesterday was read and approved.

Reports from standing committees were submitted.

Several messages were received from the Senate transmitting various bills.

The bill to allow the Commissioners of Cumberland county to refund their debt was taken up and passed its second reading.

The bill to authorize the Commissioners of Hertford county to issue bonds was taken up and passed its second reading.

On motion of Mr. Tate the Senate bill to provide another asylum for the insane to be located at Morganton, to be known as the Western Insane Asylum, was taken up.

Mr. King offered an amendment inserting the words "or Asheville," and appointing a commissioner to examine the two localities and report. He contended that other localities besides Morganton should have a chance.

Mr. Sharpe moved to amend by inserting "Statesville."

Telegraphic News.

FROM WASHINGTON.

Washington, March 12.—In the Senate the consideration of the resolution for the admission of Pinchback was resumed, and McGroarty, of Kentucky, spoke in opposition thereto.

The Freedman's Bank is in a worse condition than heretofore supposed; and therefore, the Commissioners, Greenwell, Leppard and Purvis, have asked to be relieved from any further responsibility on account of said bank, provided their bond be released from liability after their resignation, and Commissioners substituted in their place. They assign as an excuse for their action a failure to obtain from Congress such legislation as they deemed essential to the proper and speedy execution of the trust reposed in them.

Alvora will vote for seating Pinchback. Confirmation of Rankin as Pension Agent at Vicksburg was made.

The Senate had two hours wrangle over business in an Executive session to-day. They will vote on Pinchback Tuesday. His rejection is almost certain. The last part of Morton's resolution declaring Kellogg the legal Governor of Louisiana will not come up.

CIVIL RIGHTS IN ALABAMA.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., March 12.—The complaint of four negroes against Cal Wagner for not admitting them to his Muegel entertainment was heard before U. S. Commissioner Dimmick. The defendant's counsel moved to quash the complaint for imperfection in the complaint in various particulars and on the ground of the unconstitutionality of the civil rights bill. The counsel cited the Slaughter house case and Mrs. Myra Bradwell's case. U. S. District Attorney McAlfee for the complainant, cited the case of Lather vs. Borden, and he contended that this was a political question. At 4 p. m. the Commissioner quashed the complaint, but gave no opinion in the matter. It is understood that the negroes are trying to get up a complaint that will stick.

NEW HAMPSHIRE ELECTION.

CONCORD, N. H., March 12.—The returns are incomplete. The Republicans claim eleven majority in the House. The Democrats have a majority in the Council, which will prevent any removal from office.

The Democrats carried the first and second districts, and the Republicans the third.

PHILADELPHIA, March 12.—The National Fire Insurance Company has suspended.

FORGIVEN MATTERS.

LONDON, March 12.—Both Houses will adjourn for Easter. The Budget will be presented April 15th.

COURT, March 12.—The election in Tipperary was quiet. About one third of the constituents including the Roman Catholic Clergy and leading tradesmen abstained. It is estimated that Mitchell has one thousand majority.
