ADJOURNMENT OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE. CHARLESTON, S. C., March 26.—The Legislature adjourned sine die to-day.

The vetoed bill proposed to require the interest of the old bonds and stocks of the State to be funded up to the date of the funding of such bonds and stocks, while under the funding act the interest is funded only to January, 1874, and is paid in money from that date.

The veto was sustained after a sharp debate, all the Conservatives but one voting against the bill.

DEATH OF COL. RICHARD THOMAS.—BALTIMORE, March 26.—The Fort Tobacco Independent says: Col. Richard Thomas, generally called Madam Zetona, died suddenly last Wednesday night at the residence of his brother, James Thomas, St. Marys county, Maryland.
