AN ACT TO ASCERTAIN THE INDEBTEDNESS OF THE SEVERAL COUNTIES, CITIES AND TOWNS OF THIS STATE, AND TO PRESCRIBE A STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS.

SECTION 1. That all claims against the several counties, cities and towns of this State, whether by bond or otherwise, shall be presented to the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners or to the chief officer of said cities and towns, and shall be paid within two years after the maturity of such claim or claims or the holders of such claim or claims shall be forever barred from recovery thereof.

SECTION 2. That claims which have already matured, and become due shall be presented on or before the first day of January, A. D. 1877, or the holders thereof shall be forever barred of recovery thereof.

SECTION 3. That it shall be the duty of the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners of the several counties, or the chief officers of the several cities and towns, to cause the nature, amount, date and time of maturity of all claims so presented to be recorded in a book to be kept for that purpose, and to be called "The Registry of Claims."

SECTION 4. That the duty of the Secretary of State to publish this act for six consecutive weeks in the Daily News, Era and Sentinel newspapers, published in the city of Raleigh, the Journal of Commerce, published in the city of Newbern, the Daily Journal, published in the city of Wilmington, the Charlotte Observer, published in the city of Charlotte, the Greensboro Patriot, published in the city of Greensboro, the Asheville Citizen, published in the town of Asheville, the North Carolina Gazette, published in Fayetteville.

SECTION 5. This act shall not apply to any county whose debts are already audited and ascertained.

SECTION 6. This act shall take effect from and after its publication.

In General Assembly read three times and rat. and the 12th day of March, A. D. 1875.
