A N ACT TO ASCERTAIN THE IN-DEBTEDNESS OF THE DIFFERENT COUNTIES, CITIES AND TOWNS OF THIS STATE, AND TO PRESCRIBE A STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact :

SECTION 1. That all claims against the several counties, cities and towns of this bests, whether by bond or otherwise, shall be presented to the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners or to the chief officer of said cities and towns, as the case may be, within two years after the maturity of such claim or claims or the holders of such claim or claims, shall be forever barred from recovery thereof.

Provided, That claims which have already matured, and become due shall be presented on or before the first day of January, A. D., 1877, or the holders thereof shall be forever barred of a recovery thereof.

SEC. 2. That it shall be the duty of the Casirman of the Board of County Commissioners of the several count as or the chief officers of the several cities and towns, to cause the nature, amount, date and time of maturity of all claims so presented to be recoved in a book to be kept for that purpose, and to be called "The Registry of Claims."

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of State to publish this act for six consecutive weeks in the Dally News, Era and Sentinel newspapers, published in the city of Rewbern, the Dally lished in the city of Newbern, the Dally Sentinel newspapers, published of Kaleigh, the Journal of Colished in the city of Newbern, the Dally Journal, published in the city of Wilmington, the Chariotts Observer, published in the city of Chariotte, the Greensboro Patriot, published in the city of Greensboro, the Asheville Citizen, published in the town of Asheville, The North Carolina Genette, published in Facultarille.

SEC. 4. This act shall not apply to any county whose debts are already audited and accertained. SEC. 5. This act shall take effect from and after its ratification.
