A FOUNDRY IN THE PENITENTIARY.—We learn that some of our citizens contemplate establishing a foundry at the penitentiary and employing convict labor inside of the stockade to work it. There is a good opening at the penitentiary for several enterprises of this sort. A man could make money in putting up a big shoe store over there, they already make first rate shoes, and they are sold by Mr. Rosenbaum of this city. Something should be done to put these convicts to work from five hundred and sixty, not three months ago, they have increased to seven hundred, and the jails in the State are still full. A number of these fellows have nothing to do and are eating their rations at a dead expense to the State. As good stone cutters as can be found outside can be hired from the penitentiary who can easily make their three dollars a day, and some of them four. The foundry to be run there will get the contract for all the iron work on the penitentiary being built.

RALEIGH, N. C., May 7, 1875.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following report: Being appointed to correspond with the President of the R. & D. R. Co., to ascertain the lowest rate for which he could furnish transportation, from Raleigh to Charlotte and return, to fifty members, also a flat car for engine and hose carriage. We wrote to Pres' Buford April 19th, to which no response was made. On April 26th, our active member, the Hon. W. A. Smith, whom this company all cherish with gratitude, for the kindness extended them four years ago in furnishing transportation for this company at \$2 per member with free transportation of Band and Engine to and from Charlotte, being in the city requested us to again address him (Col. Buford). Again we wrote to Pres' Buford on April 26th, and he referred our letter to S. E. Allen, Gen'l Ticket Agent, who referred it to his clerk with the following result:

GENTLEMEN: N. C., May 4, 1875.
Jos. H. Green, Esq., Raleigh, N. C.
Dear Sir:—Mr. Allen before leaving for New Orleans instructed me to say to you that having had your letter to the President under consideration, the best rate he feels authorized to make your company is one cent per mile, from Raleigh to Charlotte and return for \$3.50 each. He says while the company would be glad to transfer all such organizations free, it cannot possibly do so and hopes the rate offered which is about actual cost will be satisfactory. That no partiality is intended in giving the Raleigh Military Companies free transportation, but it was deemed advisable, owing to limited numbers of such organizations in the State, to make the celebration a more complete success.

Third, that it is the sense of this Company that the Fire Department of this State are equally as useful as the military are ornamental and one is entitled to as much respect as the other.
To the gallant Fire Department of Charlotte we send you our heartfelt thanks for your kind and generous invitation to participate in the festivities of your Centennial, and while we may not be with you in a body, rest assured the mind's eye will wander back with joy, gladness and gratitude for your kind, generous and open-hearted welcome extended to us four years ago, such as only occurs once in the life time of a fireman; and while we would be pleased to be with you, circumstances over which we have no control alone prevent us.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to President Buford, and the city papers be requested to publish.
Resolved, That as President Buford may be under the impression that the Rescue Company is composed of a set of roughs, for the benefit of whom it may concern, we append a list of our active members.
