

MECKLENBURG DECLARATION.

A very sloppy letter written from Raleigh appears in the New York Herald of Monday. It starts out with the misleading statement that "there is a decided difference of opinion both here (at Raleigh) and throughout the State in regard to the paper purporting to be the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, and said to have been adopted at Charlotte on the 20th of May, 1776."

A letter in the same paper dated Charlotte, misrepresents the sentiment and path of opinion of the editor of the Sentinel, the local editor. The writer wishes the impression made that it was Oathead, the regular correspondent of the Herald, but the style of the letter convinces us that it was not he, it is some man better acquainted with the history and people of North Carolina than Oathead.

We will celebrate the Centennial whatever the Herald may say. We can celebrate the 20th, the 21st, or any day between the two. There were frequent meetings of the people about the date referred to, resolutions were passed condemnatory of British rule and oppressor. Whether a few words of Jefferson's Federal declaration were interpreted in the Mecklenburg or Jefferson copied from the Mecklenburg declaration does not disprove the fact that the people of Mecklenburg in May 1776, were the first to defy the King and promulgate the first declaration of freedom to the world, at that time Priest and King ridden. All honor to Mecklenburg without regard to day or date.

Now that Mr. Turner gave us a "new" editorial (out of old material) yesterday evening, can't he give us another "new one" on the Orange County Convention?

AN ACT TO ASCERTAIN THE RIGHTS OF THE PEOPLE OF THIS STATE TO THE PROPERTY OF THE STATE.

Section 1. That the rights of the people of this State to the property of the State shall be ascertained by a commission to be appointed by the Governor, and to be composed of three members, one of whom shall be a member of the House of Commons, and one of whom shall be a member of the Senate, and one of whom shall be a citizen of this State, and who shall be sworn to inquire into the rights of the people of this State to the property of the State, and to report thereon to the next General Assembly.

Section 2. That the commission shall have power to call upon any person who has any claim upon the property of the State, and to require him to produce the vouchers and receipts in support of his claim, and to examine the same, and to report thereon to the next General Assembly.

Section 3.
