A PAPER DUEL.—THE REPORTED DEATH OF THE MARQUIS DE CAUX.

A "tremendous sensation" was caused at Paris on Saturday by the melancholy intelligence given by the Parisian papers that the Marquis de Caux had been killed in a duel at St. Petersburg with one of the Imperial Grand Duke's aides-de-camp. The Marquis' death, according to the statement given, was instantaneous, for "he was shot right through the head."
