"LOVE'S LABOR LOST."

The Raleigh News and Hillsboro Recorder have been trying for a month to work up a bolt in Orange. They have been able to get but two men who manifested a willingness to bolt outside of the six and a half at Hillsboro. Decent men in the Patterson township have refused to circumscribe the Railroad bolting organ. The News may keep the Legislature from caucusing, but it can't make a bolt in Orange.

PRESIDENT AND FACULTY OF THE UNIVERSITY.

We could name a good president and a good corps of professors but we will not do so now, but leave that work with the trustees, who, we trust, will make such selections as will gratify and satisfy the public, and at the same time restore the old mother of so many statesmen and patriots to her former position in the great work of education and moral improvement. The columns of the Sentinel are open to all who wish to make suggestions as to who shall fill the various chairs. Without naming any we speak for the best men without regard to their religious tenets, doctrines or faith.

WHITE OR BLACK?

We hear that leading Republicans in Wake and Granville are moving to keep the negro off of the Republican ticket in these two counties in order to make the ticket acceptable to the white men. We hope they may succeed, for a pure white ticket would be more easily beaten than a full-blooded African ticket. General Willis D. Jones, of Holden court martial, Gabe Harris, who created the penitentiary on Deep River, J. E. G. Dodge, who said the "negro had no soul," and Harry Leesley are spoken of as the white candidates. We have it from one who pretends to know that the negroes will not be content to have the ticket entirely white. We shall not kick up as the Raleigh News did whether the nominees be all black, or all white, or all pumpkin seed. Brunts should never wear yellow ribbons, and we doubt if black Republicans should put forward white Republican candidates.

CONSTITUTIONAL INFILTRATIONS.

The Convention of 1868 contained some good men, but the body itself as a whole was corrupt. The late John T. Dewees who was of authority over every bus and mining in North Carolina began in that Constitutional Convention with the Wilmington, Charlotte & Rutherford Road after which there was no appropriation of money or bonds so long as the Republicans held sway, but was put through by bribery. The members of Convention gambled in State bonds by inserting a clause in the Constitution that the interest on the State debt should be paid by the Legislature, which caused a rise in bonds, the members having bought bonds at a low figure to make a "spec." by the rise resulting from the constitutional requirement for the payment of the interest. Such matters pertained entirely to the Legislature and should have found no place in the constitution. And so with the penitentiary. It should have been left with the people and the Legislature, but the negroes, carpet-baggers and speculators in constitutional clauses and conventions thought differently. The constitution, with all its contradictions, has hung like a mill stone about the necks of the people. The Radicals will propose to elect delegates to the Convention who will agree to meet and adjourn. The people will not trust them even for that plain, self imposed duty. Men who will not as they did, are not to be trusted again. It was not the fault of the people that they so behaved, but it would be the fault of the people if they trusted them again. John Post says to his Radical brethren make that the issue. If you are elected you will adjourn without delay. But the people will say when we did trust you, you made the session long enough for two, and voted yourselves eight dollars per day. We will not trust you even to adjourn the Convention.

On motion it was agreed to appoint 25 delegates to represent us in the County Convention and the chairman of the delegation was authorized to increase the number if he deemed it expedient.
