MEMORIAL ON THE STUMP. - Hon. A. S. Merrimon will address the people of Moore at Carthage on the 10th of July on the subject of the approaching election of delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

WILSON - In Gardner's township Robert Etheredge died from the kick of a mule - Mrs. Col. J. E. Lindsey near Rocky Mount is dead. - A son of S. P. Cox was drowned near Spright's bridge.

Hostwell Wilford aged 80 is dead. - Misses Skinner leave Wilson for this city to-day. - Miss Mary Graham of Alabama is visiting Wilson. - We take from the Advance.

The following gentlemen were elected as the Central Executive Committee, for Wake county by the convention at Metropolitan Hall to-day: W. W. Jones, chairman; J. H. Separk, R. G. Dunn.

Joe. A. Harris was elected a chairman of the Raleigh Township Executive Committee by the Raleigh delegation.

THE COUNTY CONVENTION. - Never have we seen a better representation of the farmers in convention assembled.

At 12 o'clock in Metropolitan Hall the meeting was organized by the election of Mr. Alfred from Middle Creek as President, the News and Sentinel men as Secretaries, and also Mr. William Pell of Cary, and Gen. Cox, Daniel Scarborough and M. Fleming were chosen Vice-Presidents.

Mr. Alfred, a hale looking farmer, made a short and excellent speech of acceptance, and motions and business of the meeting were then in order.

A full delegation from the 17 townships answered to the roll. A great many names were put in nomination, Peterson Dunn, R. H. Battle, Jr., Mike Whitley, Stanton Gales, Dr. H. W. Montague, Rufus H. Jones, Charles J. Allen, George Strong, Gen. Cox, Major Alfred, D. B. Holland, John W. Smith, Judge Fowle, W. N. H. Smith, Capt. J. W. Smith, Hon. B. F. Moore, Benj. A. Perry, Maj. J. P. H. Rums and Mr. Rand. Gen. Cox insisted on his friends withdrawing his name, and in a short sharp telling speech he implied the convention with a telling which is but the prelude of a glorious victory in August.

Mr. Strong also withdrew his name, and requested in the names of Judge Fowle and W. N. H. Smith to have their withdrawal.

Major Alfred withdrew his name. Gen. Cox had a letter read from the Hon. B. F. Moore in which that distinguished gentleman declared if in his nomination it was the sense of the people to have him canvass the county, that he wished his name withdrawn.

The different delegates then went into the vote and the following gentlemen were nominated from this county as candidates for the convention in September: R. H. Battle, Jr., Stanton Gales, of this city, Rufus H. Jones of Cary and D. B. Holland of the western section of this county.

The county to a man will walk up and elect this ticket, it gives general satisfaction. Old Wake cries good cheer to the other counties in the State, her white farmers are in earnest, they see too well as Gen. Cox said, that this Canby constitution is like a painted bee hive, while the tax payers as busy as bees are working in front of corrupt office men are stealing all the taxes from behind.

After the nominations were made, (and there was not a sign of discord or a single dissenting voice,) there was a loud and long call for "Turner, Turner," and Josiah Turner, Jr., editor of this paper, answered to the call in his bold and vigorous way, and at this hour 2 p. m., is still speaking, the reporter being compelled to get back to office duties.

The convention passed by unanimous vote resolutions requesting the State Treasurer not to exchange any more Clatsop railroad bonds for depreciated State bonds, and also requesting the Attorney General to take the proper steps to prevent the exchange.

DEATH. - In this city this p. m., at half past four o'clock Mr. Wm. T. Adams, aged 62 years. His funeral will take place from the Presbyterian church at 10 o'clock to-morrow (Sunday). Friends and acquaintances are invited to attend.

SALISBURY. - A high school for boys will be opened in September. - In last six months the Probate Judge has sent \$200 to this city collected from magistrates. - The lecture room of the First Presbyterian church has been furnished with comfortable back seats. - Miss Mattie Dean one of Salisbury's charming daughters has been married to Daniel Miller, Esq. - We take from Whitesboro.
