THE CANVASS.

The candidates spoke to-day at Forestville.

The candidates spoke in Moore's Creek Township yesterday, to several hundred people. In addition to the candidates George H. Snow, made a speech.

The people of that township are aroused, and will poll a full vote.

From all parts of the county the intelligence is cheering. The rotary Conservatives will do their duty - what say they of the city?

THE QUESTION.

The one thing above all others which should be impressed upon the people is that there is no longer any question as to whether a convention should be called or not. The question is shall the convention be controlled by the civil rights party through their delegates, or shall the conservative-democrats of the State elect a majority of delegates. Paul B. Means, Esq., of Cabarrus, is sojourning at the Yarrowburgh. He says the conservative nominee of Cabarrus will be triumphantly elected. The Cabarrus democrats have elected for their backward step.

Dr. J. T. Leach, of Johnston, is in the city to-day. He met Major Smith on the stump several times recently. He says Johnston county is rare for the democrat.

Judge Russell returned from the West and is stopping at the National.

Dr. D. D. Culp, of Franklin, is here sojourning with B. W. Moore, Esq.

Rev. Mr. Yeates, of Beaufort, was in the city yesterday, returning from the Pittboro conference.

Judge Sam. Watts missed his appointments at Charlotte and Cabarrus, where he is Greasy?

Major A. M. Lewis leaves for the mountains to-day. He goes direct to Caldwell county. He will meet Argo on the stump - if he can catch him. We are afraid, though, that Argo will fly the track like Judge Greasy has done. Argo and Lewis have paired off their votes in this county. Our mountain friends will render Major L. all the assistance he may need in hunting up Argo.

C. M. Singer, the inventor of the Singer Sewing Machine, died in London on Saturday, and his funeral will take place to-day. All of the Singer offices in this country and Europe will be closed to-day. The last thing he did was to give his daughter a marriage portion of one million of dollars. Any girl would be a singer for that - and a husband to boot.

SPEAKING AT FORESTVILLE TO-DAY.

The candidates met at Forestville to-day, and good work was done by our popular and able nominees. About four hundred citizens were present, two thirds at least were whites, Major Gates led off in his usual happy and eloquent manner. He made a powerful speech which was received with many demonstrations of applause.

Mr. Badger came next. He commenced by saying that he was not afraid of anybody, and gloried in being a mufin. He went on then to criticize the SENTINEL, or rather its present editor, with personal allusions, and to pass over. He spoke in his usual disrespectful and abusive manner of Gaston, Macon, and their company.

He alluded to the charge that he had called himself a colored man. He rolled up his sleeve and asked, "Is that arm black?" A man in the audience said, "Yes, your skin is white, but your heart is black!" He did not allude to the civil rights bill. Although it had been frequently stated from the stump by the conservative nominees that it was the policy of the Radical party to incorporate in the Constitution of this State the provisions of the civil rights bill, and to apply this to the common school system, neither Mr. Badger or other Radical candidates replied to it.

Mr. Badger was followed by Mr. Battle, who in an hour's speech went over all the ground, and refuted some of the arguments advanced by the Radicals.

Mr. Nowell was then called for, but did not put in an appearance.

Mr. Holland next took the stand and made a plain, practical address to the understandings of his audience; during which he said the tendency of Mr. Badger's remarks was to stir up strife among the different classes of society, and his (Badger's) remarks were evidently intended for that purpose.

Mr. Dodge was then called for, and called to put in an appearance. He was on the ground, but not able to rise and respond to the call.

The next speaker was Mr. Jones, who made a short, forcible and witty address. He was followed by Mr. Davis, who was speaking when our paper left.

SCOTT PARTIN.

RESOLUTIONS OF A PUBLIC MEETING

July 25th, 1875.

On the 25th instant, a mass meeting of the citizens of Wake, Johnston and the adjoining counties was held for the purpose of adopting such measures as they deemed necessary to bring to summary justice the perpetrators of the horrible murder of Mrs. Scott Partin and her infant, six months old.

J. A. Adams was called to the chair. Dr. J. T. Leach explained the object of the meeting.

The chair then appointed the following gentlemen a committee to report such resolutions as they deemed proper for the occasion: Dr. J. T. Leach, H. H. Johnston, F. Johnson, J. T. Leach, Jr., and J. T. Adams.

After a short consultation the committee reported the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, It is the duty of all good citizens to interpose their influence at all times, and under all circumstances, in the protection of the helpless and innocent, and the punishment of the vicious and guilty.

And whereas the cruel and atrocious murder and mutilation of the bodies of Mrs. Scott Partin and her infant, ten months old, by her husband and other parties, has no parallel in the past history of the world, either savage or civilized.

Resolved, therefore, that we, the citizens of Johnston, Wake and Harnett counties present, resolve ourselves into a committee of vigilance for the purpose of bringing to speedy justice the perpetrators of the horrid murder of Mrs. Scott Partin and her infant.

Resolved, furthermore, that we appeal to all law loving, and law-abiding citizens in and out of the State, to cooperate with us in bringing to justice the human monsters who committed, or were accessory to the crime referred to above.

Resolved, That we tender our thanks to the Hon. A. B. Morrison and Thos. Fuller for the kind and efficient services in ferreting out the base culprits in this foul murder of a woman and her helpless babe.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the Raleigh News and Sentinel, with the request that they be published, and that the press generally be requested to copy.

Resolved, That A. ADAMS, J. T. LEACH, H. H. JOHNSTON, F. JOHNSON, J. T. LEACH, JR., and J. T. ADAMS, do hereby certify that the above resolutions were adopted at a public meeting held at Johnston, N. C., on the 25th day of July, 1875.

A SHOOTING AFFRAY AT WELDON

No BLOOD SHED - WELDON, N. C., July 26. - Great excitement prevailed here this afternoon by a few pistol shots, being discharged at each other by Capt. Wm. H. Day, and Major Thos. L. Emery.

While several gentlemen were discussing the subject of buying the Literary property, Emery went to strong investments, which were directed at Day and others, when Day resisted the offence and attempted to draw a revolver. Emery requested that he be permitted to arm himself, which he did, and returned, when a volley of shots crossed the shed. By their shields, two large posts, the combatants were protected, and no blood was shed. Day is under bond, while Emery has left town temporarily.
