RALEIGH, N. C., Aug. 5, 1875. To the Conservatives and Democrats of Wake County:

The attention of the Executive Committee of your county has been called to a card of the Chairman of the Ex. Committee of the Republican party of Wake county, stating that every man shall be allowed to vote who swears to his right to do so, and that no other evidence is required.

This is not law. The law as contained in Battle's Revision is the law and the only law to govern at the approaching election.

The decision of the Supreme Court to which it is supposed Mr. White refers, does not declare unconstitutional chapter 53, Battle's Revision, and until the same has been declared by the court or repealed by the legislature it must be observed.

Every citizen has a right to challenge and it is the duty of the poll holders to do so, if they know or suspect a person "not to be a duly qualified voter."

Sections 14 and 15 of Battle's Revision, chapter 53, is the law. All persons who attempt to vote improperly should be arrested at once and bound over to our Superior Court.

Let us have a fair election. W. W. Jones, Chm'n. Dem. Ex. Com.

GUARD THE BALLOT BOX. Attempts will be constantly made everywhere by the Radicals to put in votes contrary to the law. The law requires that, when a voter is challenged, he shall prove the fact of his residence in the county and State, by the testimony of witnesses other than himself, and known by the judges to be credible. This law has never been repealed, nor has any case under it ever been before the courts in which it was declared to be unconstitutional. If any vote shall be challenged, and the poll-holder shall admit it without requiring proof of witnesses other than the voter, and known to the judges to be credible, let the Democratic challenge make a note of the fact in order to convict the seat of the person elected, if necessary, and to punish the poll-holder for violating the law. Never did white men have greater reason to do their duty than we have.
