THE CAPTURE OF THE ESCAPED CONVICT.—Says the Wilson Advance:—"The notorious Jim Battle, a penitentiary convict, who made his escape, some time ago, and who, it was thought was implicated in the robbery of Dr. Graves' house, was captured in Lenoir and sent to Kinston jail. We understand there was a large reward offered for his arrest. On Monday last, a negro giving his name as Moses Lewis, was arrested at Black Creek and committed to jail at that place on his own acknowledgment that he was an escaped convict. He says he broke through the guard at a brick yard near Wilmington. On Wednesday morning two shabby looking negroes, all "hip letters and tags," were taken up near this place and brought to town. They presented a very suspicious appearance, and gave a very unsatisfactory account of themselves. They first said they had been sick near Wilmington where they were at work for Capt. Berry near Fort Fisher, and being without good clothes they were ashamed to travel the public road. Mayor Kernan examined them, and when they discovered he was going to telegraph to Wilmington, they "fessed up" that they belonged to the gang who escaped from the penitentiary last Saturday. Their names as given last year were Devase and Jones. When they entered the jail, they recognized their captors, Moses Lewis, who was taken up and committed last Monday. This makes three of the birds cooped in our jail. Wilson is no place for loafers and vagrants."
