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### DEATH OF THE MAYOR

#### PROCEEDINGS IN THE CITY.

##### SKETCH OF HIS LIFE.

It is our painful duty to chronicle the death of Honorable Joseph H. Sepear, Mayor of this city. He died this morning at twenty minutes to 4 o'clock at his residence. In his last moments his bedside was surrounded by affectionate friends and kindred.

He was taken sick about July 20th, and some days after was compelled to take to his bed and expiated the Deity of Alameda in 22. His place as Mayor of the city, as if he might recover. His illness developed into typhoid pneumonia, and erysipelas supervened. It was all in vain that the most skillful physicians battled with this combination of maladies; and after much suffering he breathed his last this morning. He was conscious until the very moment almost of his demise.

The sad intelligence of his death spread rapidly over the city, carrying sadness and grief to many hearts; for he was a great favorite with everybody who knew his genial disposition and high character.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—It is difficult to state the effect of California's panic upon her manufacturing enterprises.
