time and space prevent.

The lack of libraries, reading rooms in

our midst may be attributed to poverty

both pecuniary and mental, but the

cause of the death in another branch

of amusements is truthfully set forth in

the following extract from the New York

"Tribune":

"In Raleigh they have a neat little

opera house; and in Wilmington, N. C.,

a part of the City Hall is set aside for the

drama; but in North Carolina the cost

of a license to give theatrical perfor-
mances is so great and the chance of

doing a good business seem so little, that

but few enterentertainments are ever given in

that State. The three needed per-

mits—State, County, and Town—cost

over \$1,000; mileage 60 cents each way;

lodging officers \$6; and a like compensation for

extra sessions for a period not exceed-
ing 60 days.
