### GOOD TEMPLARS IN COUNCIL.

LARGE ATTENDANCE AND HARMONIOUS SESSION.

PART DAY.  
The Grand Lodge of North Carolina held its fourth annual session in Fayetteville, beginning Tuesday, Sept. 28, at 10 A. M.

The committee on credentials reported over 90 delegates and visitors in attendance at the first day's session. (Later reports ran the number up to nearly 300.) The officers present were: N. B. Broughton, G. W. C. T.; Mrs. W. B. Pegram, G. W. V. T.; W. S. Ball, G. W. C. S.; S. J. Fall, G. W. S.; S. D. Booth, G. W. M.; J. M. Smith, G. W. A. S.

Those appointments were made pro tem: J. C. Ellington, G. W. Chap.; J. W. Lee, G. W. I. G.; S. H. Webb, G. W. O. G.; Joseph T. Crocker, G. W. T. M.; Mary E. Allright, G. W. D. M.; W. E. Andrews, G. W. M.

The reports of the officers were read, which consumed the morning session. The reports make a fine exhibit for the past year. Total number of lodges organized to date 233; total number of membership 12,272; Grand Lodge tax \$3,160.

The afternoon session was consumed in the discussion of reports of committee on finance and committee on constitution, the latter report being a code of by-laws for the Grand Lodge, which was adopted.

At night Bro. J. J. Hickman, R. W. G. T. of the World, exemplified the unwritten work in the second and third degrees.

SECOND DAY.  
A resolution authorizing the executive committee to employ a state lecturer, at a salary of \$1,000, was introduced, and discussed till the hour of adjournment.

At the afternoon session the resolution was adopted.  
The following officers were then elected for the next year: N. B. Broughton, G. W. C. T.; S. D. Booth, G. W. C. S.; Elizabeth Oaksmith, G. W. V. T.; Samuel J. Fall, G. W. S.; Virginia Ballard, G. W. T. M.; and these were appointed: Rev. H. D. Cohen, G. W. Chap.; W. C. Bowman, G. W. M.; L. E. Worth, G. W. F. M.; W. J. Stanley, G. W. I. G.; J. R. Little, G. W. O. G.; J. R. Tillery, G. W. Mess.

N. B. Broughton, Elizabeth Oaksmith and W. P. Williamson were elected representatives to the R. W. Grand Lodge of the World, which meets in Louisville, Ky., and H. D. Cohen, C. T. Murphy and B. F. Briggs, alternates.

The time of the annual meeting of the Grand Lodge was changed from the fourth Tuesday in September to the fourth Tuesday in August, and Raleigh was selected as the next place of meeting.

At night Col. J. J. Hickman spoke at Williams' Hall. After the lecture about fifty names were received for membership, and the members of the order repaired to the lodge room and initiated them.

THIRD DAY.  
The lodge opened with religious exercises. Several reports of committees were submitted and disposed of, but they are too lengthy for publication. A resolution was introduced and discussed at length, authorizing the R. W. G. Lodge to issue a charter for a colored grand lodge of the order. The resolution was almost unanimously laid on the table.

The "Spirit of the Age" was unanimously adopted as the organ of the order in the state, and steps taken to place it upon a firm foundation.

FOURTH DAY.  
The last day's session was consumed in matters entirely of interest to the membership, which we cannot publish for want of time and space. Your correspondent can scarcely make an intelligible synopsis in the short space allotted him. He would like to give some of the views of the members on the vital questions which were discussed, but foregoes the pleasure.

It was the largest, most intelligent and harmonious body of the kind which has ever assembled in North Carolina. The people of Fayetteville are without doubt, the most hospitable people in the state, as will be abundantly testified to by all the delegates in attendance.

This incomplete memorandum is closed with the promise of giving hereafter, if agreeable, some of the reminiscences of the week.

### THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

AT 10 A. M., Mr. President Ransom called the convention to order.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Pritchard, of this city.

Journal of Saturday read and approved.

Messrs. Bennett, Shepherd, Bell, and Durham submitted reports from standing committees.

Mr. Cooper presented a petition from W. C. Evans, a citizen of Cherokee county, in regard to the sale of liquor. The petition was read and appropriately referred.

By Mr. Badger, and ordinance giving the general assembly power to complete the Western North Carolina railroad. Placed on the calendar.

Mr. Boyd arose to a question of personal privilege. In his remarks on the public debt bill, on Saturday, as reported in the Daily Sentinel, he is made to say that the legislature which passed the special tax bond acts was a corrupt and bribed one. This assertion is broader than he intended it. It was not his intention to charge that any member of the legislature of 1868-69 was either bribed or corrupt, or that any fraudulent motives controlled them or their action. But what he intended to say was, that in his opinion there was a conspiracy formed among a lot of men to defraud the state; that they concealed their plans to secure the support of the members from the different sections of the state by proposing to add internal improvements throughout the state. Besides this arrangement, which had the effect to give these bills much popularity in the general assembly, shrewd and unscrupulous lobbyists were employed to urge the passage of these measures. He stated that the republican party was justly held responsible for these measures because they were in the majority in the legislature which passed them. No matter what position a minority may take in a legislative body, the majority is always held accountable for its action.

The ordinance to strike out sections 15, 16 and 17, art. 4, and insert the following was taken up:  
"Sec. 1.—The general assembly shall have no power to deprive the judicial department of any power or jurisdiction which rightfully pertains to it as a coordinate department of the government; but the general assembly shall allot and distribute that portion of this power and jurisdiction which does not pertain to the supreme court among the other courts prescribed in this constitution, or which may be abolished by law in such manner as it may deem best, provide also a proper system of appeals, and regulate by law, when necessary, the methods of proceeding in the exercise of their powers, of all the courts below the supreme court, so far as the same may be done without conflict with other provisions of this constitution."

Mr. Bennett called the previous question. The yeas and nays were called and the call was sustained by a vote of yeas 49, nays 46.

The question then recurred on the passage of the ordinance on its second reading and it passed by a vote of yeas 50, nays 46.

On motion of Mr. French the rules were suspended and the ordinance to amend art. 3, by adding a section requiring the general assembly to establish a department of agriculture, immigration and statistics, was taken up and passed its second reading.

On motion of Mr. French the rules were suspended and the ordinance was taken up on its third reading and it passed.

On motion of Mr. Turner the rules were suspended and the ordinance declaring that secret political societies are dangerous to the liberties of the people and should not be tolerated, was taken up and passed its second reading.

By Mr. Holton: A resolution to pay the contestants from Robeson county, Messrs. Norment and McNeill, per diem and mileage up to the day that the case is decided.

On motion of Mr. Holton the rules were suspended and the resolution was taken up and adopted.

The ordinance to strike out sec. 33, art. 4 was taken up.

Section 33 reads as follows:  
"The several justices of the peace shall have exclusive original jurisdiction, under such regulations as the general assembly shall prescribe, of all civil actions founded on contract, wherein the sum demanded shall not exceed two hundred dollars, and wherein the title to real estate shall not be in controversy; and of all criminal matters arising within their counties where the punishment cannot exceed a fine of fifty dollars, or imprisonment for one month."

Mr. Bowman was opposed to it. Mr. Jarvis was in favor of it. Mr. Barringer was in favor of the ordinance.

On the passage of the ordinance, on its several readings, Mr. Penning called the previous question.

The call was sustained by the following vote: Yeas, 50; nays, 48.

The question recurred on the adoption of the committee's substitute given above. On the demand of Mr. Badger the yeas and nays were called, and the substitute was adopted by a vote of yeas 51, nays 47.
