HOUSEKEEPER'S RECEIPT.—How to construct slap-up slapjacks—Take a tablespoonful of fine flour and putit inte s three-gallon pan ; add a pint of gine an cunce of borax, three quarts of good yeast-powder, two pounds of putty, a gunjunrubber over-shoe, half ounce cream of tartaric acid, quarter pound of greased wool, one pint choice yellow sand and a pinch of snuff. If you need it in a hurry, kneed it in a hurry. Then from it out smooth into thin sheets. Put it on one side of a griddle and flop the griddle over, but don't be in too much of a hurry. Just before setting on the table, run them through your sewing-machine and quilt them in dia-mond patterns; also bind the edges neatly with a strip of red flannel, and work eyelet holes in crochet for your teeth. Butter with stove-polish, and serve red-hot on the half-shell. Eat with a sausage-mill and your eyes abut. They will be found admirable for dyspepties and children with weak ears
