PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

A large congregation turned out both morning and evening to hear Rev. Dr. Vaughan. The morning sermon from the text of St. Matthew vi : 19: "Lay not up for vourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal," was continued in the evening, and upon both occasions was listened to with deep attention. The doctor is one of the most eloquent men of the southern church, and his pews are always full.

SWAIN STREET BAPTIST. At the Swain Street Baptist church resterday morning, there was a good attendance. The pastor, Rev. J. D. Hufham, preached from Isaiah xxxv: 8. The plan of saving lost sinners is revealed to us in the text under the familiar figure of a road or highway. It indicates that action and effort are necessary for those who would enjoy the blessings of salvation. The highway is for travelers. The promises of that gospel are only to those who sale, week, knock and strive. Those who do nothing are lost, inevitably lost, "How shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation?" Progress is also indicated. The believer must grow in grace and in knowledge. It is a royal way, devised in heaven and finished and made known by Jesus Christ. It is a matter for thankfulness that this plan of redemption has God for its author. We can trust men in other things, but in reference to our relations to God and future life we can be satisfied with nothing less than the word of God himself, Since God has spoken his directions must be followed implicitly and fully.

At night the pastor's text was taken from Matthew xvi : 26 : "For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" The worth of the soul in God's estimation was shown in the following considerations : the provision made for it in creation ; the adaptation of the world to man for his spiritual and intellectual being; the provisions made for its redemption in the coming and sufferings of Jesus Christ; the spiritualism of the soul itself which raises man above the brute creation; its immortality, &c. The sermon was an able one in every respect and made a deep im-

CHRIST CHURCH.

The services at Christ (Episcopal) church were appropriate to the day,the first Sunday in Advent. The rector, Rev. M. M. Marshall, rend the service and preached a suitable and impressive discourse from Matthew xxv: 13: "Watch, therefore, for ye know neither the day nor the hour when the Son of man cometh." The singing of the choir showed a narked improvement and it is now equal to any in the city, though but a short time in practice. In the afternoon, vespers were sung.

SALISBURY STREET BAPTIST. The pastor, Rev. Dr. Pritchard, occu-

pied the pulpit at both the morning and evening services. In the morning the cessity, nature and effects of regene ration were discussed from texts found in John iii: 3, Matthew xviii: 3 and Titus iii : 5.

The necessity of being born again was first presented and was argued from scripture, from every man's experience of the wickedness of his own heart, from what we see of the evil conduct of men, and from the holy nature of heaven,

Regeneration was in the second place distinguished from baptism, from a mere change of religious opinion, from an outward reformation of conduct, and defined to be an internal spiritual chang of principles, thoughts, views and feelings, wrought by the Holy Ghost and effected instantaneously.

The evidences of regeneration the doctor summed up as follows : Sorrow for and a turning away from sin; Love for the brethren; Love to God, manifesting itself in pleasure in prayer, praise, &c. : The continued performance of good works,

In the evening the sermon was addressed to young men and was based upon Jeremiah fii : 4 : "Wilt thou not from this time cry unto me, My father thou art the guide of my youth?
