THE ORPHAN ASYLUMS.—REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT MILLS.—The report of this gentleman, submitted last evening to the masonic grand lodge, in regard to the present status of the orphan asylums at Oxford and Mars Hill, is very interesting, and reflects credit upon the zeal and energy displayed by that gentleman in his labors in so good a cause. Regret is felt in not being able to give the report in full. Contributions to the Oxford asylum from Dec. 1, 1874, to Nov. 30, 1875, amounted to \$13,095.98. Disbursements for same period, \$12,540.37, leaving on hand a balance of \$551.61. These figures include the receipts and disbursements for Mars Hill until Sept. 1, when the books of that institution were opened. The number of orphans reported as present at Oxford last year was 132; admitted since that report 59, making 182; discharged 57, died 2, ran away 3, expelled 2, leaving 105 inmates at present.

U. S. CIRCUIT COURT.—The court met this morning at the usual hour, Judge Brooks on the bench. The case of Seymour & Co., of New York, vs. the Western Railroad Company, for \$250,000 damage, for alleged violation of contract, was taken up and occupied the entire day. J. W. Hinsdale, of this city, D. A. Barnes, of Murfreesboro, and S. F. Phillips, of Washington, D. C., appeared for the plaintiffs, and W. McL. Kay and J. C. McRae represent the defendants. Yesterday afternoon the jury in the case of Murphy & Co. vs. the Old Dominion Fire Insurance Company, of Richmond, Va., gave a verdict awarding \$1,500 to the plaintiff. \$2,000 was the amount sued for.

REV. A. W. MANGUM.—In sketching the various members of the recent Methodist conference in Wilmington, the Star, of Dec. 8, has this to say of Rev. A. W. Mangum, so well known and beloved in this city: "One of the most accomplished members of the body which has just adjourned was Rev. Adolphus W. Mangum, of illustrious lineage, who as scholar, orator, poet and pastor, is a household word in many counties of North Carolina. The age of Professor Mangum is about 40. He came to the conference in 1866, and was made Professor of English Literature and Belles Lettres last summer in the University of North Carolina. Professor Mangum had been previous to his election to the Professorial chair, a minister of the Methodist church in full connection. Handling a fluent and graceful pen, his contributions of prose and verse have enriched the newspaper and book press for many years. He has published one volume of poetry, 'Myrtle Leaves,' and was for a time on the staff of a weekly religious and literary paper, the Message, published at Greensboro. He graduated at Randolph Macon College. Professor Mangum is above the medium in height, is lithe, graceful, erect with his fine, shapely head covered with greyish dark hair and beard thrown back. His expression lights up strongly in speaking, and he talks with energy and fervor. His style as an orator may be inferred from this physical inventory.

There will be an excursion from Weldon to Portsmouth, Dec. 31, for the benefit of the Methodist and Episcopal churches at the latter place. The total contributions in cash from September 1 to November 30, for Mars Hill asylum were \$358,21. One mile was sold for \$100 and \$110 received from the Oxford asylum, making the total receipts \$563.24. The disbursements during this time amount to \$348.30, leaving on hand \$44.14. The contributions in kind have not been so liberal as might have been expected in a country blessed with abundant crops, but some few individuals have made frequent and liberal donations. Repairs on the main building and the erection of other buildings, the purchase of furniture, &c., have caused the expenses to be rather heavy, but these improvements are of a permanent character. The number of orphans admitted to this asylum has been 35, expelled 1, ran away 2, discharged 3, leaving now present 29 of them. 10 were transferred from Oxford, some to assist in entertainments and others for their health. The continuance of this institution is recommended by the superintendent for various reasons, and the people of the west are urgently appealed to give a more hearty support to it.
