Resolved, That we commence this important work in full confidence that the proposed graded school will be liberally sustained by the people of Raleigh; the object being to secure to the children of Raleigh the opportunity to obtain a good education free of charge.

State vs. William B. Surles, et al., from Cumberland, argued. Attorney General Hargrove, Smith & Strong, Neill W. Ray and T. M. Argo for plaintiff, and W. A. Guthrie for defendant.
