A VOICE FROM THE MECHANICS.

LET THE DEMOCRATIC EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ANSWER. RALEIGH, N. C., Feb. 15, 1876.

Ma. TURNER. In an editorial in your paper of last Friday, you call for organization by the democratic party. I like the sound you send forth, but before it is heeded there is a very considerable portion of that party, known as mechanics and laborers, that desire to know whether or not the Daily News, published in this city, in any way, represents the democratic party and its principles.

HAIR-RAKERS AND JACKSONS. and boys, they were enabled to continue their operations. Indeed, encouraged by their success in thus employing the poor man, they at once increased their facilities, enlarged their borders and set to work to induce new trade, and, if possible, monopolize the work.

Other proprietors in the city felt the low prices created at the News office, and asked the printers' union to reduce their rates to \$16 a week, union to them as an argument that the News, by reason of employing risk, was enabled to so under-cut them as to cause eventually great injury to the printing fraternity.

LOOK AT THE OUTRAGE. Again, all the employing printers were placed upon one footing as to prices paid to hands, and left to rely upon merit. But what does the News Publishing company do? Having the poor men in their power, whom they had forced to leave the union, they compel them to go down lower and to work for twelve dollars a week, and that too with a proviso that so much work must be done, above ordinary, or a reduction would be made pro rata.

STARVE WOMEN AND CHILDREN, and make rich a stockholders' corporation of mushroom aristocrats. Now, Mr. Turner, these are facts, as they have been related to me by one of the victims of this ruthless war on labor, and from them the following conclusions have been drawn:

1. That the typographical union of this city has done more to elevate the mechanic of this city than all other causes combined, and in so doing deserves and has the hearty sympathy and co-operation of every mechanic, be he freeman or slave.

2. That the News Publishing company first drove more to destroy living wages; oppress the mechanic and laborer; degrade them and their families; and injure business generally than any or all agencies that have ever been brought to bear in this city.

3. While we recognize the right of the News Publishing company to under-work their neighbors, if they wish, though by no means a laudable enterprise, yet we do deny their right to oppress any part of the community in so doing. In other words let them but their brains out if they wish, but in so doing let them not butt out the brains of others.

Lastly, The Daily News claims to be the central organ of the democratic party, its establishment is petitioned and patronized by our democratic city commissioners, and the paper passes as their acknowledged organ. There are

MORE THAN TWO HUNDRED MECHANICS in this city, and thousands in the state that desire to know if the Daily News or the News Publishing company, in any way, represents the democratic party. If so, they are to be counted out, and are for any movement that will crush out a corporation that thus seeks to crush them. These are the sentiments, air, not of printers alone, but of carpenters, machinists, moulders, stonecutters, shoemakers, tailors, bricklayers, bookbinders and workmen generally, and of those who ally the same.
