Swain vs. McCulloch, from Guilford. Argued, Gray & Stamps and Mendenhall & Staples for plaintiff and Scott & Caldwell contra.

Wattinson vs. Montgomery, from Rockingham. Argued, Gray & Stamps and Dillard & Gilmer for plaintiff and Seales & Seales contra.

Joseph Harris vs. D. A. Jenkins, Public Treasurer, and B. A. Air-Line R. R. Co., from Orange. J. H. Fleming for plaintiff and Merrimon, Fuller & Ashe, J. B. Battelleur and Walter Clark for defendants.

NEWS AND NOTES.

In Paris the Carlist cause is considered hopeless. The National Democratic Convention met in St. Louis July 22.

Much damage has been done to property by floods in upper Austria. The prohibitionists of Rhode Island have renounced a full state ticket.

Rep. republicans of Indiana, have found at a Gudiove B. Orth for governor. About 200 delegates attended the general mass convention at New Haven yesterday.

Wellington, Kidder & Co., New York rectifiers and distillers, have failed for \$200,000. The Senator Franconia has been detained at London for an inquiry into the Strathclyde disaster.

The English government is negotiating extradition treaties with some of the South American states. The English bitterly deny the exclusive right of the French to fish off the coast of Newfoundland.

Schubert & Sons, New York bankers, have gone under with a \$150,000 debt hanging around them. The opposition in the English parliament, led by Lowe and Gladstone, severely criticized Disraeli's purchase of the Suez canal shares.

The French chamber of deputies is composed of 280 republicans, 100 Bonapartists; the remainder being legitimists, Orleanists and constitutionalists. William A. Darling and Spencer N. Green, president and secretary of a New York savings bank, have been arrested for securing a false exhibit in 1871.

In Baltimore yesterday Prof. D. C. Gilmer was inaugurated as president of the Johns Hopkins University. Gov. J. L. Carr still resides at the university, opens in October. In a Chicago saloon yesterday Geo. Cameron shot and killed Fred Schneider and then killed himself.

The Brooklyn Advisory Council have appointed a committee of 9 to draft the report of the Council. It is reported that nearly all of the positions of Plymouth church have been sustained. The national association of the veterans of the Mexican war are going to have a celebration at the Philadelphia Centennial. General Albert Pike, of Arkansas, and H. S. Lane, of Indiana, have been appointed orators.

The Hillsboro tobacco market is looking up. The Milnes and Sutherland railroad business is being pushed. Cal. Newgate escaped from the Barry county jail a few days ago.

Large railroad meetings are almost daily occurrence in the west. The Mount Airy narrow gauge railroad is now considered a fixed fact. Michael Wall, of Barry county, died last week at the age of 105 years.

The children's concert at the Oxford Orphan Asylum was a lively affair. The Fayetteville Knights of Pythias have been indulging in festive entertainments. According to the Chronicle, Milton has a number of juvenile candidates for the gallows.
