GRAMAM, N. C., Feb. 24.

At 12 o'clock on Wednesday the prisoner appeared and took his seat behind his counsel, Messrs. Ruffin, Fuller, Parker, Boyd and Bason. On the other side, with Soticitor Strudwick, sat Messrs. Strong, Dillard and Gilmer. Solicitor Strudwick called on the prisoner to stand up, and hold up his right hand. He then read the bill of indictment charging him with the murder of Adolphus G. Moore, and asked, "are you guilty or not guilty?" "Not guilty." said the prisoner. "How will you be tried?" "By God and my country?" was the reply. "God send you a true deliverance." rejoined the solicitor. The solicitor then effered an affidavit for the removal of the cause from the county, because the friends of the prisoner had been active in their efforts to forestall public opinion and to prejudice the cause of the state. Three several persons were named as active in this work. The affidavit was adjudged sufficient cause for the removal. Mr. Fuller said his client would prefer trying before another judge, because of the unfriendly relations which had long subsisted between his client and the court (Judge Kerr.)

CHEAP ADVERTISUSG-RING RASCALITY.

An animated contest, in which the usual mean and masorupulsas course o the managers of the Dairy News is made manifest, has just come to light. For the past week or two the "strikers" for that sheet have been very industrious y button-holing prominent merchants of the city, advocating the great advantage of a new and unique scheme of advermanagers of that concern. They would offer any of their principal advertising patrons as many copies of their weekly gratis, containing their advertisements. as they would agree to mail and pay pos-tage thereon. Several merchants ac-cepted of this "cheap john" offer, and agreed temporarily to accept weekly of a hundred or more copies of the paper. By this means the subscription the News was largely increased! The enquiry naturally suggests itself to all these advertisers: How can the News them? these advertisers: How can the News managers make such a plan pay them? The answer is thus explained: The last general assembly passed an act relating to insurance companies, whereby they were required to furnish the secretary of state periodically a statement of their assets, liabilities, &c., and it was made the duty of the secretary to have the same published in "one of two newspapers in the city having the largest circulation." It is asserted that the News managers lobbied industriously for the passage of this act. The advertising remanagers lobbied industriously for the passage of this act. The advertising required is estimated to be worth from \$1,200 to \$1,500 s year and perhaps more. The News ring has indisputably enjoyed the fat advertising under this act for the past twelve months, as it was not known by our city publishers that such a law was enacted until the publication of the acts. Anticipating this knowledge by other establishments. publication of the acts. Anticipating this knowledge by other establishments, the News managers adopted the sharp practice and cheap advertising dodge mentioned above, and by this means hoped to overreach their city rivals for the advertising domanded. to overreach their city rivals for the advertising.
