RECEIPTS FOR WEEK ENDING FEBRUARY 26, 1876.

388 hales; receipts for week ending March 4, 1876, 421; receipts for past two weeks, 809; receipts for corresponding two weeks last year, 2,455; decrease in receipts for past two weeks, 1,645; receipts for the month of February, 1876, 1,707; receipts for month of February, 1875, 4,357; decrease in receipts for month this year, 2,650; whole receipts since 1st September, 1874, 31,105. Receipts for same time last year, 27,555; increase in receipts to date this year, 3,550. It will be seen that our receipts have very materially decreased during the past month. This can be accounted for by the low price and dull market, the market closing at 1 1/2 for best grades, while the market at this time last year was active at 15 1/2 to 15 3/4 cents. The great depression in business all over the country must continue to depress cotton and keep prices down.

A VETERAN SUBSCRIBER.—Edward Chappell, who lives six miles from Raleigh, called this morning to renew his subscription to the Sentinel. He was born in Wake county in 1787, and is consequently in his 89th year. He has been a regular subscriber to the Sentinel and its predecessor, the Raleigh Register, ever since 1822, over half a century. As he left, taking the hand of the editor, he exclaimed in tones somewhat tremulous with age and patriotic feeling: "God bless you, my young friend, and prosper you and every other man who is laboring to free the country from the clutches of the thieves; and God help the honest people of the land, for if He does not, there's no help for them!"

First case for hearing in the morning is W. H. & R. S. Tucker, vs. city of Raleigh. Messrs. E. G. Hayward, D. G. Fowle and G. H. Snow will appear for the plaintiffs, and Busbee & Busbee contra.

Court adjourned until to-morrow at 10 o'clock.

COURT-HOUSE BURNED.—The court house at Snow-Hill, Greene county, was burned last Wednesday night. All the county records, books and papers, were destroyed, and great inconvenience will result from the disaster.

Gov. CASWELL'S GRAVE.—Copying the recent letter of Judge Battle in response to a suggestion of the Sentinel in regard to a monument to Richard Caswell, North Carolina's first governor, the Magnolia Record, of March 2, adds: "The above from the Raleigh Sentinel is worthy the patriotic consideration of our people. 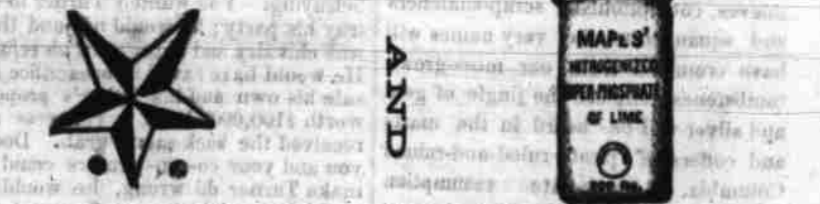
