A NIGGER CONVICT FINDS A BOX OF GOLD COIN AND HE SUFFERS FOR IT. Something over a month ago a nigger convict in the workhouse of this county, by the name of J. P. Davis, found a small box of gold coin while at work in the low-grounds of that institution. He gloated over the treasure for a while and then buried it in a field near by. The secret was too big for him to keep, and he disclosed it to Solomon Buffalo, Alfred Gorham and George Robinson, his associates. Soon the matter leaked out. Yesterday afternoon Davis and his friends came to this city and got a warrant from Justice of the Peace Magnin for the arrest of Frank Ferrell, Isaac Holderfield, Ben. Mathis and Weston Rogers, white men, who they accuse of beating and cruelly mistreating them in order to force them to tell where the treasure had been hid.

THE RADICAL OUTRAGE.

AN EFFORT TO BREAK UP THE MEETING OF THE DEMOCRATIC STATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—GENERAL COX PROBABLY TO GO TO WILMINGTON.

We learn that Gen. W. R. Cox is in receipt of a telegram announcing that a U. S. official will arrive in this city today, from Wilmington, in order to serve upon him the warrant of arrest, issued by U. S. Commissioner Cassidy, of Wilmington, upon the ridiculous charge of having conspired with the commissioners of Robeson county to defeat the will of the people of that county in the election of delegates to the late constitutional convention. The general will doubtless be obliged to go to Wilmington to-morrow, and thus he will be prevented from attending the meeting of the democratic state executive committee in this city.

NEWS AND NOTES.

Japan has declared war against Corea. Taft has qualified as secretary of war. Pendleton and Boynton are to be examined to-day. The Prince of Wales sailed from Bombay Friday for home. The landwehr of Dalmatia has been called out to protect the frontier. Gorham, the new assistant secretary of the interior, qualified yesterday. Chas. Brest, alias Clarence Rivers, the forger, has been arrested in London. Wells' evidence before the naval committee was the same as that given in 1872. The Turks lost 60 killed and 50 wounded in the recent battle with the insurgents. Pendleton is to be examined to-day by the committee on war department expenditures. The London Times says that a nice sense of humor does not prevail among American officials. It is said that Kellogg is going to appoint Warmoth U. S. senator vice Pinchback, couldn't get in. Daniel Drew, of New York, has gone into voluntary bankruptcy. Liabilities \$600,000; assets unknown. The Maine municipal elections took place yesterday. As far as heard from the republicans have made gains. The Liverpool Cotton Brokers' Association expelled several of its members at a recent meeting for underhand dealings. A London dispatch announces the shipment of Lord Aylesford's wife with the marquis of Blandford, eldest son of the Duke of Marlborough. The terrific tornado which passed over the northern portion of Missouri Friday, demolished the little town of Shranky, a once county. McMahon will no longer preside over the French council of state. The chief of the cabinet will discharge the office of president of the council. The town of Hazel Green, Wisconsin, was almost destroyed Friday by a terrific tornado. Nine persons were killed and 20 houses demolished. Hon. J. B. Beck, of Kentucky, has been elected umpire of the boundary line commission between Maryland and Virginia. The commission meets in Washington in May. The nigger lieutenant-governor of Louisiana, Antoine, got his back up about Pinchback being ousted from the floor of the senate.
