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CLARK-HOWERTON LIBEL CASE.

PROCEEDINGS THURSDAY AFTERNOON. The court met Thursday afternoon in Metropolitan Hall, Mayor Mann presiding.

Q. Who was present at all these conversations? A. They were not all present at every conversation; sometimes it would be Mr. Armstrong and James H. Eunis, sometimes Mr. Lambeth and James H. Eunis.

Q. Did you tell anybody about this before you wrote your letter of the 8th, except the three named? A. I did not.

Q. Who was that letter from? A. It was from my mother, stating that there was something wrong with Dr. Howerton's account, and that Gov. Brogden had sent for father to go on the committee to examine the accounts, but as they were both from Salisbury he refused to go or have anything to do with it.

Q. How many times did you talk with John Armstrong about it? A. I am not positive as to the exact number of times. I tried to get the facts from him every opportunity that I had.

Q. How came Mr. John Armstrong to talk with you about it? A. It was the subject of conversation between

RALEIGH, N. C., March 27.—Politics in this state are in a fearful state. It is evident to every one that a race has been formed here also at a tangle of "champion" rig, and that the people will have to pay for it.

Gov. Brogden has been considered an honest man, but recent developments would seem to prove that he is about as bad as many of his associates. The state auditor, Kelly, refused to admit the secretary of state's bills, and it is openly charged that the latter officer is guilty of systematically swindling the people.

The railroad ring is likely to divide the democratic party in this state. Leading democrats are making every effort to break down the Raleigh faction, the leading democratic paper in North Carolina, for its persistent exposure of the ring's doings.

The Hon. W. R. Cox, chairman of the democratic executive committee, who was arrested on a trumped-up charge and dragged to Wilmington, N. C., by a United States deputy marshal, was, at the instance of the United States district attorney, promptly discharged. The arrest was purely a malicious one, and was made for political causes.
