## CLARK-HOWERTON LIBEL CASE.

### SATURDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

The court met pursuant to adjournment Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, Dr. W. H. Mayes, Mayor, presiding.

The cross-examination of Col. J. D. Clark was continued by the defendant.

Question. Is not Col. Clark a leading subscriber in the New Publishing Company? Answer. He is, and is the president of the company.

Q. Does he not in a more or less, sue to what extent, control the matter that shall appear in the New? A. He does not control the matter to any extent.

Q. Has he not within the last month written to you in the New? A. As to that question I do not know, that I am not sure.

Q. At least of February I went home to Rutherfordton on Saturday afternoon. On Sunday I was taken sick and was not able to return to Raleigh for ten days.

The editorial writer for that period with one exception, supplied by myself, was

prepared here, I do not know by whom.

Q. Please look at the New of the 21st ultmo and state whether the editorial entitled "Persecution" is the article and was written by Col. Clark? Q. No, not by prosecution and object overruled by the court. A. Yes, or that is the article I referred to as written by Col. Clark as I learned from him.

The article headed "Persecution" was here read by F. R. Puttell, counsel for defendant.

Q. Had Col. Clark any knowledge of the intention of the New of the 9th to publish the article from the Index-Appelate to the New? Objected to by the prosecution and the objection was overruled. A. Col. Clark had knowledge of it.

Q. State whether prior to the publication of the article of the Index-Appelate, signed N. S., March 9th, Col. Clark did not directly or indirectly by writing, conversation, advise, incite or direct its publication? A. The publication was made entirely at my own suggestion, though with a full knowledge of Col. Clark that I was to make it.

Q. State whether or not Col. Clark had anything to do with the preparation of an article that appeared in the New of the 17th March, headed "Turner-Howerton Conspiracy" or any part thereof? Objected to by prosecution and the objection sustained by court.

Q. Was not Col. Clark informed of the alleged peculation in office of the defendant, or of a rumor of such peculation prior to the alleged conversation between Col. Clark and the defendant, say prior to the 21st February? If yes, how long before? A. I have no reason to believe that he was.

Q. Had you not with him, or in his presence, a conversation touching the alleged charge prior to the 21st February, 1876, or how otherwise? A. I had not.

Q. Did not Col. Clark at any time prior to this date give you such statements that you would infer from them that he possessed such information? A. He did not.

Q. Did not Col. Clark admit to you, or to your presence, that he was aware of the rumor of this charge, as of a time prior to the 21st of February, 1876, whether such admission was made subsequent or prior to that date? A. Since then I think Col. Clark has spoken of a vague rumor which he had heard, possibly some time in January.

Q. State at what time the insurance statements or reports were taken from the New; and given to the Advocate? A. I have understood those reports to be given out annually; they were given to the New; they have not been renewed; I do not know the exact date.

Q. What did the New get for the publication of the reports last year? A. I don't know how much in the aggregate, the price paid for each one was \$0.00. I presume there was nearly one hundred of them.

Q. You stated that the columns of the New were under the control of no one but yourself. State whether you consider you have the right to change the policy of the New without consulting the manager?

The question was objected to and pending the argument of the objection the court adjourned to meet Monday at 3 o'clock.
