A FATAL DUKE. A telegram from Richmond, Va., states that Thaxton T. Robinson and Jesse Mitchell, young men highly connected in Campbell county, Va., met on Tuesday last at New Providence church, near Hillsburg, in that county, to settle an old feud with pistols. Robinson was shot in the abdomen, and Mitchell received one shot in the head, which instantly went through his cheek and lodged in the back of his neck, and another in the breast. The latest report states that Robinson is dead, and Mitchell could not survive. The difficulty is understood to have been about a woman. Robinson was a lieutenant in the United States army, and has been absent several years on duty on the Texas frontier, and Mitchell has been recently appointed United States gauger.

CONGRESSIONAL.
