IN MEMORIAM.—The Elizabeth City Economist pays this handsome tribute to the memory of our late honored cuti-zen, Dr. Johnson:

"Another distinguished native son of the Albemarle gaue. Dr. Charles E. Johnson did in Raleigh Saturday, April 1, aged 64 years.

Dr. Johnson was a native of Chowas county and was a son of Charles E. son, long distinguished as a gentleman of the highest character, of large wealth and for political distinc-tion of the democratic faith. The grandfather of Dr. Johnson was the Hon. Chas. E. Johnson, of Chowan, who represented the Edenton district in congrees during the closing administration

Dr. Johnson was well educated, first at the Edenton aca lemy when under and R. R. Heath. From this excellent natitution he went to the University of Virginia, where he was the classmate of R. M. T. Hunter, of Vicquiia. After leaving the University of Virginia he gradua ed at the medical university of Penusylvania. After his graduation he practised medicine successfully for several years, in the town of Edenton. in copariners in the town of Edenton.

C. Warren. He sub-equently removed to Ralegh, where he was a long resident until his death.

Dr. Johnson has long held the front rank in his pr fession in North Carolina, and until enfectied by disease, was its acknowledged head. He was surgeon general of the state in the early part of the civil war, and was upon the battle field of Manassas soon after the fight, with his medical staff, attending ight, with his medical staff, attending the wounded. He was the originator, founder and first president of the North t arolina Medical Society, and by his energy, activity end personal influence, contributed greatly to its auccessful establishment.

Always a student, and by natural taste and careful cu ture, of super or literary and scientific attainments, Dr. Johnson had at different times contributed to the literature of his profession several medical works of high repute."
