He decided that the appeal from the issuance of the mandamus did not operate as a supersedeas, but the only return to be made, to avoid contempt, was full and prompt obedience, and ordered the mayor and aldermen to order an election, and point the necessary registrars, and in-spectors of election, for the first Mouday in May, under the charter of 1857 and subsequent amendments, and make a return of their action by 11 o'clock next day.

This morning the board of aldermer held a meeting and directed the mayor to make a return of due obedience to the commands of the court. The following registrars and inspectors were appointed at the meeting of the alder-


