OLD TIM STAISTICS—The Ox-
ford Torchlight, in its last issue, gives
the following table of old time statist-
ics. It is of interest. Read it:
In 1812, Williamsboro was the only
postoffice in Granville county. James
Sneed was postmaster and the receipts
of the office were \$61.89.
In 1816, the number had increased to
three, viz: Williamsboro, Alberton, and
postmaster. Receipts of office, \$14.20.
In 1817, the number had increased to
four, viz: Williamsboro, Alberton, post-
master. Receipts of office, \$14.20, and
LeMay's Cross Roads, John Nuttall, post-
master. Receipts of office, \$7.44.
In 1819, under Gen. Washington's
administration, there were only four
postoffices in North Carolina, viz: Edlen-
ton, receipts, \$55.75; Washington, re-
ceipts, \$9.18; Newbern, receipts, \$4.
18; Wilmington, \$29.18.

The United States supreme court
Monday, delivered several important
decisions. The court sustained the con-
stitution of the state courts of Illinois
as to railroad taxation and the validity
of the act retroceding Alexandria to
Virginia and also decided that where
parties claiming gold from the govern-
ment voluntarily accept free city notes,
at the same time entering protest, the
latter is insufficient to qualify the effect
of the waiver evidenced by the accept-
ance.

THE CITY CASE.

Yesterday in the
superior court the case against the
present city authorities came up,
and the motion of the defendants to
dismiss was refused, and the plaintiffs
were given permission to amend an
answer. The matter was set to come up to-day,
but up to the hour of putting this issue
to press nothing had been heard from
it.

B. GODSHED AND RIO ADVISED.

THE RADICAL MEETING LAST EVEN-
ING—INCENDIARY SPEECHES.

Last evening the radical of this city
met at the courthouse to glorify over
the decision of Judge Henry in the city
case. Ye valiant General J. C. Gor-
man presided. Speeches were made
by the fee-loving solicitor of this district,
J. C. L. Harris; the congressional as-
piring revenue collector, L. J. Young,
who is man after the hearts of Grant
and others of that ilk; the little man who
could not be superintendent of public in-
struction, one T. B. Farnell and sundry
other small fry pot house politicians.
Like Young is credited with having
advised the niggers to take the law
into their own hands and take
violent possession of the city govern-
ment. He, it is said, told them to take
possession of the city offices and com-
pel by force, if necessary, the mayor
and aldermen to hold an election con-
trary to law. In compliance with the
order of court. In this connection we
will mention a rumor which was about
on the street this morning. It said that
shortly after Adjutant-General Gorman
refused arms to a white company in
Newbern, he issued to a nigger company,
in this city, of whose existence few if any
of our citizens have heard, some 80
muskets or rifles, and yesterday, in con-
sequence of the excitement attendant
upon the city imbroglio, this issue of
arms was supplemented by a box of
cartridges. How is this? Do the white
radicals intend to lead their nigger al-
lies into riot and bloodshed? We ad-
vise you white radicals to go slow in
this matter and keep within the pale
of the law, for if you commence this
game you will find to your cost that two
can play at it.

BISHOP GIBBONS—Eloquent Ser- mon Last Evening—Mass and Con- firmation This Morning.

In accordance
with previous announcement the
Rev. James Gibbons, Catholic bishop
of the diocese of Richmond, Va., and
administrator of this Vicariate, ar-
rived in this city yesterday afternoon,
and despite of great fatigue pre-
ached in a very large congregation at
St. John's (Catholic) church in the evening.
The bishop took his text from the
18th, 19th and 20th verses of the
38th chapter of St. Matthew, and
gave to his hearers a discourse of
marked eloquence and re-
plete with convincing logic and im-
mortal illustrations. The major
portion of the sermon was devoted to
the perpetuity of the Roman Catholic
church. He traced the history of the
church from the time of its
establishment by the Lord Jesus
Christ down to the present time,
and gave a summary of the bitter
persecutions which the church has al-
most constantly undergone, but triumphed
over. The Catholic church had sur-
vived the wreck and ruin of 19 centuries,
and though the object assailed an
enemy on every hand, she stood to-
day stronger and more united than
ever before. This stamped her with the
imprint of divinity. The bishop then
proceeded to show how the church had
waged a constant war with infidelity
and atheism, and checked the onslaughts
of so-called christian princes and rulers
upon the liberties of their people; how
the bloody Crescent was prevented from
bringing under its sway the fairest
portions of Europe by the Bishops of
Rome; how the church had ever been
the fostering mother of literature, the
arts and sciences. It is impossible,
in the space at command, to give even the
outlines of this able and impressive
sermon. Aside from its smooth and
beautiful rhetoric, it was made doubly
attractive by the array of interesting
facts brought forward. At the conclusion
of the sermon there was Benediction of
the Blessed Sacrament, Rev. Father Bailey
officiating.

This morning high mass was cele-
brated and a large congregation at-
tended. At the conclusion of the mass,
the bishop administered the Sacrament
of Confirmation to 16 candidates—7
young ladies and 9 young men. The
bishop's remarks in explanation of the
efficacy of the sacrament, and his words
of exhortation to the recipients, were
deeply impressive. They were tender
and eloquent, and inculcated beautiful
and holy lessons.
