DEATH OF E. W. FULLER

It is with profound regret we announce the death of this accomplished gentleman It occurred at the residence of his mother at Louisburg, Saturday evening 8:30 o'clock. Mr. Fuller was a young man of thre ability and possessed all the virtnes that attract and compel esteem. In the literary world he was best known as the author of the beautiful poem Angel in the Cloud, and a charming novel en-titled Sea Gift. Although a young man, born Nov. 30, 1847, he had achieved a reputation in the field of letters which will cause his name to be preserved along with those which have been perpetaated by the honor they did the state of their nativity. Though an invalid for some time, Mr. Fuller's death was unexpected. Friday he actively engaged in his avocation, that of a merch when he was seized with a chill and
