THE CITY CASE—A RETURNING SENSE OF PROPRIETY IN JUDGE WATTS.

On yesterday the defendants in the case of Gorman and others against Manly and others perfected their appeal by giving the necessary bond, notices and other legal formalities. During the afternoon counsel called the attention of Judge Watts to the fact that notwithstanding the appeal the clerk had issued writs of mandamus to the sheriff, and the sheriff was proceeding to execute them. His Honor expressed an opinion that the appeal acted as a supersedeas, and that the sheriff ought to take notice of the appeal and ought to return the writs to the clerk.

Mr. Tourgee, of counsel for the plaintiffs, made a violent argument in opposition, contending that by the appeal the case was transferred to the Supreme Court, and that Judge Watts had nothing to do with it.

Judge Watts stated that he agreed with the counsel that the case was in the Supreme Court and that, therefore, the sheriff ought not to execute the writs issued from the Superior Court until the appeal was determined in the Supreme Court.

This opinion of His Honor is regarded by all the lawyers of the city, except Gorman's coterie, as clearly right, and we are glad to note that notwithstanding the partisan bias exhibited on Saturday there are some positions that even Gorman's counsel cannot make his Honor take in plain opposition to the law. This case, together with the mandamus case of April last, will be argued in the Supreme Court about the middle of July.
