BY AUTHORITY.

AN ACT supplementary to the several acts making appropriations for the year one thousand eight hundred and eighteen.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and they are hereby, respectively, appropriated, and shall be paid out of any money in the Treasury, not otherwise appropriated.

For the payment of balances due several states, on an adjustment of their accounts, for expenses incurred by calling out the militia, during the late war, six hundred thousand dollars.

Towards erecting barracks on Baton Rouge, forty thousand dollars. For carrying into effect the treaty with the Cherokee Indians, eighty thousand dollars.

For defraying the expenses of holding Indian treaties in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighteen fifty three thousand dollars.

For arrearages in the Indian department, thirty five thousand dollars.

For additional pay to the militia, fifty thousand dollars.

For expenses of mounted volunteers, ninety thousand dollars.

For pensions for one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, in addition to the sum already appropriated for that purpose, fifty thousand dollars.

For pensions to officers and soldiers of the revolutionary army, under the act of the 18th of March last, three hundred thousand dollars.

For deficiency in the appropriation for clerk hire, in the office of the Department of War, for the year one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, eight hundred dollars.

For rent of offices for the above department for the year one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, five hundred dollars.

For office rent for the above department for one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, one thousand dollars.

For additional clerk hire, a sum not exceeding fifty thousand dollars.

AN ACT concerning tonnage and discriminating duties, in certain cases.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That so much of the several acts imposing duties on the tonnage of vessels in the ports of the U. States, as imposes a discriminating duty between foreign vessels and vessels of the U. States, is hereby repealed, so far as respects vessels truly & wholly belonging to the subjects of the king of the Netherlands; such repeal to take effect from the time the government aforesaid abolished the discriminating duties between her own vessels and the vessels of the United States arriving in the ports or places aforesaid.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That so much of the several acts imposing duties on goods, wares, and merchandise, imported into the United States, as imposes a discriminating duty between goods imported

into the United States in foreign vessels and in vessels of the United States, be, and the same is hereby repealed, so far as the same respects the produce or manufactures of the territories in Europe, of the king of the Netherlands, or such produce & manufactures as can only be, or most usually, are first shipped from a part or place in the kingdom aforesaid, the same being imported in vessels truly & wholly belonging to subjects of the king of the Netherlands; such repeal to take effect from the time the government aforesaid abolished its discriminating duties between goods, wares, and merchandise, imported in vessels of the U. States & vessels belonging to the nation aforesaid.

AN ACT limiting the time for claims being produced for lands authorized to be granted to the inhabitants of New Madrid.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the U. S. of America, in Congress assembled, That every person claiming lands in virtue of the act, entitled "An act for the relief of the inhabitants of the late county of New Madrid, in the Missouri territory, who suffered by earthquakes," passed on the seventeenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, shall make application therefor, and produce evidence in support of his claim, to the recorder of land titles for the said territory on or before the first day of January next; and the said recorder shall not issue a certificate for any claim as aforesaid, the evidence in support of which shall not have been produced to him within the time limited as aforesaid.

AN ACT for the relief of Ashael Clark.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the U. States of America in Congress assembled, That the accounting officers of the Treasury Department be, and they are hereby, authorized and directed to settle the accounts of Ashael Clark, on account of two judgments obtained against him in the supreme court of New York, at the suit of Peter Silvermail and Abraham Silvermail, with reasonable costs and charges; and the sum so found due shall be paid to the said Ashael Clark, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

AN ACT for the relief of captain Henry Gist and captain Benjamin Johnson.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the proper accounting officers of the Treasury Department be, and they are hereby, authorized to audit and settle the respective accounts of captain Henry Gist and captain Benjamin Johnson, late of the army of the United States, in such manner, and upon such terms, as may be reasonable and just.

AN ACT to continue in force an act, entitled "An act relating to settlers on lands of the United States."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That an act, entitled "An

act relating to settlers on the lands of the United States," passed the twenty-fifth of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, be, and the same is hereby continued in force for one year, from and after the third day of March last.

AN ACT for the relief of Samuel F. Hooker.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the proper accounting officers of the Treasury Department be, and they are hereby authorized and directed to settle the claim of Samuel F. Hooker, of Sackett's Harbor, in the state of New York, for property taken & occupied for public use, at Sackett's Harbor aforesaid, and for a house and barn destroyed by the enemy, during the late war, at Cape St. Vincent, or Gravelly Point, which had been rented by authority of the United States for barracks; and the sum which shall be found due, shall be paid to the said Samuel Hooker, out of any moneys in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated: *Provided*, That the sum so to be allowed, and paid, shall not exceed, in the whole, three thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven dollars and sixty-six cents.

AN ACT to increase the salaries of the Judges of the Circuit Court for the District of Columbia.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the U. States of America in Congress assembled, That in addition to the compensation heretofore allowed by law, to the Judges of the circuit court of the District of Columbia, the sum of five hundred dollars per annum be paid to the chief justice of the said court, and the same sum per annum to each of the assistant judges of said court, payable quarter yearly; the first quarterly payment to be made on the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighteen.

AN ACT for the relief of John Hall, late a major of marines.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the U. States of America in Congress assembled, That the proper accounting officers of the Treasury Department be, and they are hereby, authorized and directed to credit John Hall, late a major of marines, with the sum of two thousand four hundred dollars in the settlements of his accounts, the same being part of a sum of money deposited in the hands of the said Hall for the purpose of purchasing supplies for the marines under his command, and of which the said Hall was robbed in Marsailles in France.

AN ACT for the relief of John Seybold.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That John Seybold be permitted to withdraw his entry with the register of the land office for the District of Vincennes, for the purchase of the south west quarter of section number twenty-five, in township number one north, range number two west. And the receiver of public monies for the said district shall be authorized to allow the said

Seybold a credit on any purchase he shall or may have made of other public lands in the same district for the money paid on the entry by him withdrawn.

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE U STATES.

WHEREAS by an act of Congress, passed on the 3d of March, 1804, entitled, "An Act making provision for the disposal of the public lands in the Indiana Territory, and for other purposes," and an Act passed the 3d of March 1805, entitled, "An Act supplementary to the act, entitled, an act making provision for the disposal of the public lands in the Indiana Territory," and an act passed on the 25th of April 1808, entitled, "An Act supplemental to an act regulating the grants of lands in the Territory of Michigan," the President of the United States is authorized to cause the lands in the land district of Detroit to be offered for sale when surveyed; and whereas a part of the said lands have been surveyed:

Therefore I, JAMES MONROE, President of the United States, in conformity with the said acts, do hereby declare & make known, that public sales for the disposal (agreeably to law) of the said lands, shall be held at Detroit, in Michigan Territory, viz:

On the first Monday in July next, for the lands contained in ranges 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13, south of the base line; on the first Monday of September next for the lands contained in ranges 13, 14, 15, 16, and 17, north of the base line; and on the first Monday in November next, for the lands contained in ranges 9, 10, 11, and 12, north of the base line, excepting such lands as are, or may be reserved in said district, by law, for the support of Schools, and for other purposes. The sales shall continue open for two weeks and no longer, and shall commence with the first section of the lowest number of townships and ranges, and proceed in regular numerical order.

NOTICE. It is expected that the Judges will certify, as well to the reduced circumstances, as to the continued service of nine months, required by the law of the 18th March, 1818: and pensions will invariably be refused, unless the declarations of the applicants shall be accompanied by such certificates. The applications for pensions belonging to New Hampshire, New York, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, N. Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia, will be delayed until further evidence of their service shall have been received from the several executive offices of the states.

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE U STATES.

WHEREAS by an act of Congress, passed on the 3d of March, 1817, entitled "An act to authorize the appointment of a Surveyor for the lands in the northern part of the Mississippi territory, and the sale of certain lands therein described," the President of the U. States is authorized to select certain lands, for scites for towns, and cause the said lands to be laid off into town lots, and the said lots to be offered for sale—

Therefore I, JAMES MONROE, President of the United States, do hereby declare and make known, that public sales for the disposal of the lots in the town of Marathon (heretofore called Milton's Bluff) on the south bank of the river Tennessee, (near the head of the Muscle Shoals) in Alabama Territory, shall be held at Huntsville, in the said territory, on the second Monday in October next.

The sales shall continue open for one week, and longer if necessary; & the lots shall be offered for sale in regular numerical order, beginning with the lowest number,

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE U STATES.

WHEREAS by an act of Congress, passed on the 3d of March, 1815, entitled, "an act to provide for the ascertaining and surveying of the boundary lines fixed by the treaty with the Creek Indians, and for other purposes," the President of the United States is authorized to cause the lands acquired by the said treaty to be offered for sale when surveyed:

Therefore I, JAMES MONROE, President of the United States, do hereby declare and make known, that public sales for the disposal (agreeably to law) of certain lands in the Alabama territory, shall be held at Milledgeville in Georgia viz:

On the third Monday in October next for the sale of town lots, in the town of Cahaba, in the said territory situate at the junction of the rivers Alabama and Cahaba.

On the third Monday in October next, for the sale of townships 13, 14, 15, 16, in ranges 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 15; and of townships 14, 15, 16, in ranges 14 and 16 of the land district in Alabama territory, directed by law to be sold at Milledgeville, excepting such lands as have been reserved by law for the support of schools, or for other purposes; each public sale shall continue open for two weeks, and no longer. The town lots, and other lands, shall be offered for sale in regular numerical order, commencing with the lowest number of lots, sections, townships and ranges.

And I further declare and make known, that the offices of the register and receiver of public monies for the said district, shall be removed from Milledgeville to the aforesaid town of Cahaba, on the first day of January, 1819.
