TOWN TAXES.

THE Subscriber gives Notice, that he
 has been appointed by the Commis-
 sioners of the Town of Newbern, to re-
 ceive the lists of taxables in said town
 for the present year.—He will attend at
 his store in Pollock-Street the last twenty
 days in July, (Sundays excepted) for that
 purpose. Those who fail to give in within
 twenty days, are subject by law to a pen-
 alty of Forty Shillings and to a double
 tax. To enable the Commissioners to as-
 certain what lots and parts of lots are
 not given in, and to subject such to their
 just share of taxation, it is required that
 each list should designate the number of
 the lot given in, the street on which sit-
 uated, and the quantity of ground where
 less than a whole lot is returned.
