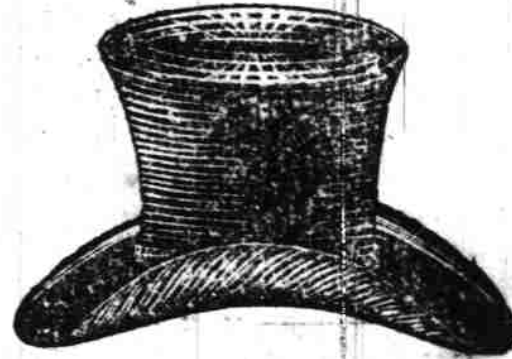

## MISCELLANEOUS.

### ON A REVISION OF THE TARIFF.

FROM MR. CAMBERLING'S 'EXAMINATION.'

#### To the Farmers of the United States.

No men have a better right to this book on taxes than those who pay the largest portion of them. Yet, were we to judge from the noise and bustle about the New Tariff, we should be disposed to think that the other active members of this community, the manufacturers and merchants, with the politicians who lead them, are the only persons interested in the question. When we have patiently passed through this volume we shall, perhaps, be better able to understand which class of this community is most deeply interested.

Every class in the nation has its particular interest; and when any measure affecting industry is introduced to the attention of Congress, we find them all vigilant enough; it is proper that they should be so, it is one of the strong bonds of society, and restrains government from extravagantly favouring any one class at the expense of the others.

It is now proposed to us to adopt the system long since practised by the British government viz:

To prohibit importations, in order to protect our own manufactures;

To establish a system of internal excise, or taxation, to supply the deficiency in our revenue, arising from such prohibition of imports; and

To allow drawbacks of that excise, on the exportation of the manufacture, to encourage our home industry.

After these are established we suppose bounties are to be paid on particular manufactures, to encourage their growth; and as our farmers will be compelled to buy all their goods from our own manufactures, we presume it is also intended to prohibit the importation of corn and wheat from Europe, that our manufacturers may in turn be compelled to buy our own corn to encourage the cultivation of these productions at home. Such is the skeleton of the British system.

Whatever may be the real advantages of this system, it would be well enough for us to understand what it truly is, before we adopt it. We have endeavored, in the following pages, in as plain a manner as possible, to strip of their artificial ornaments those magical words, productive
