

arrival from Puerto Cabello we have been favored with the particulars of this circumstance which may be relied on, and by which it appears that the Spanish frigate Ligera saw her convoy safe into Puerto Cabello in sight of the blockading squadron. The brig of war Hercules remaining outside was attacked by the Colombian vessels, who immediately desisted upon perceiving the frigate going out to the assistance of her consort.

By the last accounts the Spanish vessels were anchored off Punto Bravo, in consequence of the outward bay being commanded from the heights round Puerto Cabello, with nearly 150 invalids from the Spanish army, bound to the Havana. We have not learned any particular news by this vessel, except that Puerto Cabello remains in the same state. The object of this vessel coming into this port is to obtain a supply of provisions for the voyage.

By advices from Porto Rico, we are informed of the arrival at St. John's, on the 30th ult. of H. C. M. brig of war Vanguard, having on board Don Francisco Linares, and Dr. J. D. Diaz, the former appointed civil governor, and the latter intendant of that island. By this vessel brigadier Sebastian Calzada, an old commander in Venezuela, and St. Fe, has arrived; he is destined for the expeditionary army of Costa Firme, and appointed second in command to gen. Morales, who is nominated general in chief. It is said that General Calzada is the bearer of most important dispatches from the new ministry of Madrid. Before the departure of the Vanguard, several transports sailed from Cadiz, under convoy of 2 sloops of war, for the coast of Galicia, to receive on board 1500 troops, to reinforce the army in Venezuela. Orders have also been sent to Havana to remit \$30,000 monthly for the support of Morales army.

IMPORTANT INTELLIGENCE.

By an arrival yesterday from Coro, the following official important intelligence has been received here, with which we have been politely favored, and hasten to lay the same before our readers.

Official despatch from Gen. Morales to Gov. Carrera y Colino.

Yesterday morning at day light, I commenced my march from Juritoba, for the purpose of attacking the enemy, who, according to information that I had received, were in the vicinity of Buchivacoa. On my arrival I learnt that the enemy had marched to Davajuro. I immediately ordered that the division should counter-march by the road of the Hato del Padre, for the purpose of refreshing the troops, it being about 12 o'clock. They had not finished when I found myself suddenly attacked in the rear, with great impetuosity, and after a vigorous resistance made by the rear guard, assisted by several columns which I ordered to advance upon the enemy, I succeeded in completely routing them, and dispersing them in every direction, by my troops.

The loss of the enemy consists of Col. Pinango and seven officers, who have fallen into our hands, and upwards of 200 rank and file in killed, wounded and prisoners.

Our loss has been very trifling in comparison with that of the enemy; and as soon as I receive the returns I shall inform you of the result.

I have ordered Col. Lorenzo to pursue the enemy in the direction of the Pedregal, by which road they are flying in the most shameful manner.

I have the honor to communicate this important intelligence to you, for your own satisfaction, and that of the troops and towns under your command.

God preserve you many years.— Given on the field of battle, Davajuro, 8th June, 1822.

Extract of a proclamation of the Governor of Coro.

I have this moment received the following dispatch from Colonel Don Juan Tello—

I have just surprised this town, and have made 20 prisoners. The troops of general Soublette were completely routed and dispersed yesterday. I still continue pursuing his flying forces, which are every moment falling into my hands.

I communicate this for your satisfaction, and that of the loyal inhabitants of Coro.

God preserve you many years.— Commandancia General, Zuzarilla, 4 o'clock, A. M. 8th June, 1822.

Extract of a dispatch of Col. J. Tello, to General de la Torre, in Puerto Cabello.

Amongst the articles taken on the field of battle in the late action, are 200 cargoes of provisions, 200 mules, the military chests, music and colours, all the private papers and military correspondence of Gen. Soublette. The battalion of Boyaca has suffered very severely, very few having escaped.

The following are extracts from several letters received by the same opportunity, and we are inclined to give them credit from the respectable sources from which they have emanated.

Coro, 11th June.

The remains of the divisions of Soublette, Reyes Vargas and Torrelles, have been pursued by Lorenzo and Tello, and there is no doubt but that they will be entirely destroyed. The loss of the enemy up to this date is more than 400 rank and file, among which are 23 officers, 500 new muskets, with all their ammunition, camp equipage, baggage and provisions.— Among the slain is an English colonel. Pinango is among the prisoners, and has been treated with great generosity and the respect due to his rank, by the brave general Morales. The Spanish army has to deplore the loss of three of her bravest officers, viz: Bolet, Fresno, and Fernandez, who fell in the hottest of the action, leading on their troops to victory and glory. Our loss has been, in killed and wounded, 97 rank and file.

Later intelligence states, that the loss of the enemy amounts to upwards of 600 men—and sanguine hopes are entertained that General Soublette, who escaped with only two attendants, would finally fall into our hands.

FROM HAVANA.

NEW-YORK, JUNE, 28.

Capt. O'Bryan, from Havana, informs that the French brig Charles Williams Capt. Ferrier, from Harve, with dry goods, &c. valued at 180 to 200,000 dollars, was robbed of the principal of the cargo on the 4th inst. off Sugar Key, by three piratical schooners. The Charles Williams arrived at Havana on the 6th.

The English brig Hebe, Chatwin, from London, with dry goods, hardware, &c. valued at 110,000 dollars, was robbed of the principal part of her cargo on the 6th of June, off Sugar Key, by three piratical schooners.

The U. S. schooners Shark and Grampus were supposed to be in the neighborhood of the Key: hopes were entertained that they would succeed in falling in with and capturing the freebooters.

The S. U. brig Enterprize, Lieut. Kearney, arrived at Havana on the 13th inst. and would convey out a fleet on the 16th.

Intelligence of the proceedings of the American government respecting the emancipated Spanish colonies, had been received at Gibraltar, and must have immediately reached Spain. We shall soon know what impression they have made at Madrid. A friend has placed in our hands a pamphlet in Spanish, recently published in the Spanish capital, and entitled "Observations upon the Memoir of Don Luis de Onis, relative to the Negotiation with the U. States." It is a well written, temperate defence of the government and people of the United States against the misrepresentations and charges of the Chevalier de Onis. The author avows himself to be a citizen of the United States, and suggests properly that, in exposing and refuting the mistakes and extravagancies of the Chevalier, he conceived himself to be rendering a service to Spanish as well as to his own country. We are glad that an antidote to the famous Memoir has been provided in Spain, where alone it was likely to do mischief. We do not believe that the least notice has been taken of it in any other part of Europe.—Nat. Gaz.

NEWBERN, JUNE 20th, 1822.

THE Commissioners of the Town of Newbern give Notice to the Inhabitants thereof, that it is the intention, as it is the duty of the Board, to endeavor to cause all nuisances which may be injurious to the health of the town, to be removed. They remind the inhabitants, that by the act of the Assembly for preserving the health of the sea-port towns of the State, the following are declared to be common nuisances, viz.—all ponds of stagnant waters; all cellars and foundations of houses, whose bottoms contain stagnant waters; all dead and putrid animals, lying about the docks, steets, alleys, or vacant lots or yards; all privies, that have not proper wells under them; all docks whose bottoms are alternately wet and dry, by the ebbing and flowing of the tide.

By the same act, proprietors of lots which from their low situation are liable to retain tide or rain water, or on which cellars or foundations of houses may be dug, whether a tenement be erected over the same or not, are required, during the months of June, July, August, September and October, to keep the said lots, cellars and foundations dry and free from stagnant and putrid waters and other filth, under the penalty of Five Dollars for every week such nuisance shall remain thereon.

The Commissioners entreat the Inhabitants of the Town to examine the premises they respectively occupy, and to remove speedily, all nuisances which may be found upon them.—They hope there is no citizen of the Town so indifferent to the lives and happiness of his own family, or so callous to the distresses of his neighbours, as to be backward in adopting measures so essentially necessary to the health and prosperity of the Town. If, notwithstanding the strong inducements to remove nuisances, any citizen should be found neglecting his duty, the Commissioners will feel themselves under the necessity of causing prosecutions to be instituted against them in the proper Courts.
