

he is persuaded, will continue to prove commensurate to the support of government and to the defraying all such other items of expenditure as will probably be authorized; his motive being merely to shew the probable continued solvency of the Treasury.

There are, at present, and for some time past have been, very considerable sums of money due to North-Carolina by bonds originally given for sums less than one hundred dollars; the makers of which are widely dispersed, and dwell in distant and different sections of the country; and it being evident that much difficulty and delay, not to mention probable loss, will necessarily attend the collection of those monies, unless some special provision be made to ensure and facilitate it, the Treasurer would hereby respectfully submit to the Legislature, the propriety and the necessity of extending the like remedy against the makers of such bonds, as is at present provided by law, and in use, against such revenue officers of the state who fail to account and pay up as they are bound to do; or, of providing such other practicable remedy as shall be considered more proper and advisable.

WEDNESDAY, NOV. 27.

Mr. Spaight presented a bill to repeal the first section of the act of 1821, to provide an additional fund for Internal Improvements—Referred.

On motion of Mr. Burgin, the committee on the Militia laws were directed to enquire into the expediency of revising and amending them.

The bill to repeal the second section of the act of 1821, respecting the Supreme Court—and the bill to repeal the act of 1821, increasing the toll at the Big Bridge in New Hanover, were read the third time in this House—and ordered to be engrossed.

THURSDAY NOV. 18.

On motion of Mr. Strange, Resolved. That so much of the report of the Public Treasurer, as relates to debts due the state under one hundred dollars, be referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Mr. Burns presented the petition of John Roberts, praying to be released from prison—Referred to Messrs. Burns, Moore, Henry, Burgin, and James Graham.

On motion of Mr. Beall, a select committee was appointed to enquire into the road laws, and to enquire into the expediency of amending them.—Referred to Messrs. Beall, Lamon, Macay, McMillan, and Nixon.

RICHMOND, Nov. 22.

The General Court formed a Quorum on Monday last, and proceeded to business. The suit of the Commonwealth, vs Mathew H. Rice and securities for a defalcation of about \$22,000 of the public monies, (coming into his hands as Agent of the Penitentiary Store,) was expected to come on—but on Tuesday the defendant exhibited an affidavit, stating the absence of material witnesses and papers, as the ground for continuing the suit. The Court yielded to his application—and the case is accordingly put off till the spring term of the General Court.

A Broker of this City had collected a considerable sum in notes of the Banks of North-Carolina—the banks refused to redeem them in cash, or acceptable funds. The consequence was, that the Broker had them protested, and immediately instituted suits for their amount in the Federal Court of North-Carolina.

At the term of the court, which had just transpired; the suits came to issue. While the jury were out, but before they brought in their verdict, the Cape Fear Bank made amicable propositions for the settlement of the claim against them, (at least \$60,000 which was acceded to on the part of the Plaintiff. With the precise character of these propositions we are not acquainted. The Broker requests us to add that the State Bank of N. Carolina held out until judgment had been obtained against them to a considerable amount for principal and interest—which were finally paid off by the Bank.

The United States' Circuit Court commenced its November term at Providence, last Friday. "The whole of yesterday," [Monday] says the American, "was occupied in the trial of the interesting case of Tracy vs Wood, continued from the June term, the Jury being unable to agree on a verdict. It will be recalled that Col. J. B. Wood, of this town, while in New York in November last, was entrusted by Mr. Tracy with 12,000 dollars in gold pieces, to be sent to Boston—This money was procured from the baggage of Col. Wood, while on board the steam-boat, and no credit to the theft was ever discovered. The owner of the money seeks to recover from Colonel Wood the amount lost, on the ground that he did not use suitable precautions to prevent its being stolen. The magnitude of the case, superadded to the desire to witness an exhibition of the powers of Mr. Webster, who was of counsel for the plaintiff, attracted an immense crowd of auditors, among whom were a large number of ladies. The court continued in the evening till 6 o'clock the next morning, and Messrs.

Robbins and Webster closed the arguments in favour of the defendant, when Judge Story summed up the evidence to the Jury, who retired at three o'clock, and at 6 returned a verdict for the plaintiff of \$5,700, with cost—thus dividing the loss.

A Philadelphia paper states that Baltimore was nearly depopulated by the departure of the inhabitants for the race.—Some hundreds had gone from Philadelphia and New-York. The bets were immensely heavy, amounting, according to the Democratic Press to a million and a half of dollars! It is added that one bet was tendered on Sir Charles, of 800 negroes, valued at \$300 each—that on Monday 100,000 dollars were sent from Baltimore for bets, &c.

Canal Revenue.—The canal commissioners, in their report to the legislature, at its last session, estimated the revenue to be received the present year, at the collector's office at Utica, at \$40,000. We are now informed, by one of the commissioners, that from the amount already received, it will probably fall little short of \$60,000. Albany Daily Advertiser.

We understand that more than four hundred young gentlemen have already joined the medical class of the University of Pennsylvania, and that a considerable accession is expected.—Phil. Union.

Since the first of January, sixty-seven of the officers of the United States Navy have died.

From a report made to the Legislature of Kentucky, it appears that their famous Bank of the Commonwealth, has issued notes to the amount of 2,792,063, 87, and has in specie the astonishing sum of—two thousand six hundred thirty-three dollars, twenty-five cents.

BRIG SPARK.

NORFOLK, Nov. 25.

A friend has politely favored us with the following extract from a letter, received from an officer on board the U. S. Brig Spark, Captain Wilkinson. The painful intelligence which it communicates, relative to the mortality and sickness on board that vessel, excites our warmest sympathy, while it manifests the propriety of the orders said to have been recently issued by the Navy Department, prohibiting our cruisers from entering unhealthy ports, without absolute necessity, and even under such circumstances, from remaining there longer than may be indispensable.

"U. S. Brig Spark, at Sea, off the Island of Santa Cruz, Nov. 5."

"Since I wrote you by the Alpha, we have been to St. Thomas and St. Domingo twice, and have watered both times.—We have also been to Lagaira, to our cost, for when we arrived there, we had a first, second and third Lieutenant; a Master, Purser, Surgeon, Boatwain and Gunner, but, now, alas! the ward-room mess consists of your humble servant and two boys. Mr. Nicholson left us two days before we sailed from Lagaira, to take command of a vessel belonging to Sailing Master Hearty, but he was taken sick and died in one day. Mr. Fanning, Purser, died on the 24th Oct. on our passage from St. Domingo to St. Thomas. Two days ago we sailed from the latter place, having been there three days, during which time several officers were taken violently ill, and were sent on shore—what their fate is at this time I am unable to say. There never was a healthier crew than ours has been, never having more than two or three on the sick list at a time; the sickness appeared to be confined to the ward-room and steerage.

"We left the Cyane at Lagaira, sickly. The day after we sailed she lost a Surgeon's Mate and four seamen: She expected to sail in a few days for Porto Cabello, but waiting to learn the result of the prevailing news, which was that Morales had landed a few miles from Lagaira, burnt a small town, and intended to go to Caracas.—The people of the place, particularly the Americans, were in the greatest consternation, for fear of their property. Since that time we have heard the report contradicted, and it is probable she has sailed.—Yesterday we were in chase of a two-top-sail schooner for 7 hours, but could not come up with her. We looked into Christianstadt, in Santa Cruz, this morning; the brig Orion, Crawford, for Norfolk, was there, and on our standing out she followed; we shall see her through Sail Rock Passage to night. It is likely we shall send into St. Thomas in a day or two to look after our sick." Beacon.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

By the arrival at New-York of the brig Nancy, Captain Mathews, the Editors of the Commercial Advertiser have "Gibraltar News" to the 18th October, containing Madrid dates to the 9th, and Genoa to the 2d, and Lisbon to the 3d of the same month.

The sitting of the Extraordinary Cortes commenced on the 8th. An official letter read, stating the inadequacy of the military establishment of 51,000 infantry and 6,500 cavalry, and requesting that the Cortes would decree in increase of \$7,965 of the former, and 7637 of the latter. This increase, it was contended, was necessary

for the constitutional system. The latter was referred to the committee of war.

These accounts appear to confirm what we were fearful was the case from reading the latest English and French papers, that the affairs of the Greeks are more gloomy. It is stated that they have experienced reverses, and that it is even not known where the fleet is. Some think it is dispersed through the Archipelago for the purpose of protecting and saving the unfortunate families. The Turkish squadron is blockading Corfu, and the vice-consuls of foreign nations have fled through fear and the inhabitants are flying to the mountains for safety.
