AN ACT concerning the apportionment of Representatives in the State of Alabama. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, from and after the third day of March, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-three, the State of Alabama shall have three members in the House of Representatives, in the Congress of the United States, it appearing from the returns of the Marshall of Alabama, deposited in the office of the Secretary of State of the United States, that the said state of Alabama, at the passage of the act, entitled "An act for the apportionment of Representatives among the several states, according to the fourth census," approved March the seventh, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two, was entitled to the number of three Representatives, according to the population of said State, and the ratio established by the said act.

AN ACT making a partial appropriation for the support of Government for the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-three. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the sum of two hundred and sixty-five thousand one hundred and forty dollars be, and the same hereby is, appropriated for the compensation granted by law to the Senate and House of Representatives; and that the same be paid out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated. APPROVED—JAN 14, 1823.

AN ACT to repeal part of an act passed by the state of Maryland, in the year 1748, and now in force in Georgetown in the District of Columbia, entitled "An act for an addition to Georgetown in Montgomery county."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That so much of the third section of an act of the General Assembly of the state of Maryland, entitled "An act for an addition to Georgetown in Montgomery county," as prohibits the proprietors of lots on the north side of Water-street, from erecting buildings on the south side of said street, or on wharves made on the south side of the aforesaid street, be, and the same is hereby repealed: *Provided*, That the proprietors aforesaid shall not have power to erect any building or building on the south side of said street, not authorized by an ordinance of the corporation of Georgetown: *And provided also*, That after being thus authorized by the said Corporation, the proprietors aforesaid may sell and dispose of their property on either side of said street, without affecting the title to that on the other side, as effectually as they could have done before the passing of the aforesaid act of Maryland.

AT A MEETING

OF the BOARD of COMMISSIONERS of the Town of Newbern, held on the 11th instant, it was *Ordered*, That from and after the fifteenth day of February, 1823, no Cooper's Shop shall be built within a less distance than one hundred feet of any other building, nor shall any such Shop that may be already built, remain, except it be thus distant from any building, after said 15th of February, under a penalty of Fifty Dollars a month for every month such Shop or Shops shall so remain in violation of this Ordinance.
