EXTRACT OF A LETTER

From the Revd WILLIAM W. HILL,
of the County, N. C. dated May
22d, to a gentleman in Newbern.

"THE long expected conflict for my
Official Life and Character, was sustained
yesterday. The business commenced
about ten in the morning and ended after
dark. Four hours, or thereabout, were
consumed in manoeuvring; finally, with
much difficulty, a Committee of five men
was impaneled, and the trial commen-
ced. I am pleased to inform you, that
after a vigilant search of several months,
nothing tangible was brought against me,
except the simple, inconsistent, impossi-
ble say-so of an unfortunate woman. I
met, encountered, and conquered it with
a weight of testimony, which, I am happy
to assure you, overwhelmed the most in-
veterate opposition—as Doctor WALLER
of Washington, I doubt not, will testify
he came believing I ought to die, and
was determined I should meet my desert.
Discordant views and feelings excited a
sharp conflict between us, of a few hours
continuance; but as a man of principle,
he yielded to the violence of truth, and
left me, if I may judge from his assura-
nces, a more zealous friend than he
me, in one sense, an enemy. The Com-
mittee were unanimous in their verdict of
innocence of my part. Should nothing
prevent, the affair will soon commence
the circuit of the winds.
"The conduct of some of the agents in
the trial, has possessed my wife with
a belief that neither innocence nor charac-
ter are safe in the hands of some persons
in the Methodist Church, and she has
determined to seek refuge among the
Presbyterians. I shall stand as I have
done, perhaps to meet the violence of
future storms."

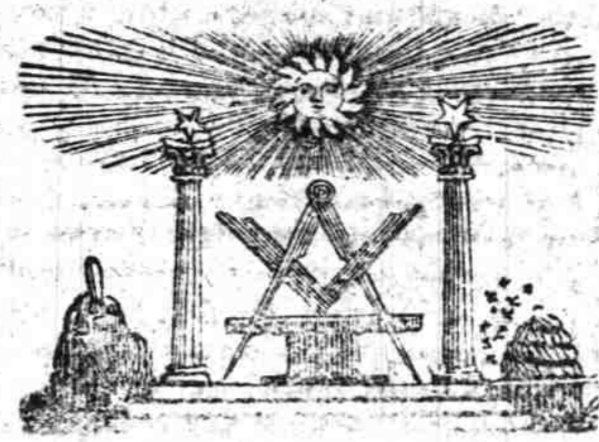
