**NORTH-CAROLINA INDEPENDENT ADVOCATE.**

"It is shameful for a man to live in his own country and to be uninformed of her affairs and interests."

THE INDEPENDENT ADVOCATE will be exclusively devoted to the cause of the People, and to the promotion of correct information, upon all those subjects in which they may be, directly or indirectly, participators. The Constitution of these United States declares this government to be based upon the will of the People, and that, in its creation and operation, distinctly marked by their creative and moving powers. This Government is certainly a creature of the people—but do they control its movements? Who can ascertain the will of the People, in those political contests for supremacy, where they are fashioned like clay in the hands of the potter, to suit the purposes of political demagogues? And who can say that the government moves agreeably to the controlling power of the People, when they are kept in ignorance of its acts, by the duplicity of political pariahs? How many of the people appreciate the privileges of their own Government over those of others? Or who correctly distinguish between the controlling power of a despot over their minds, and a subserviency to the views of the ambitious and designing? This apathy to their best interests: this pliancy to the will of others, is owing to a want of a general diffusion, of correct political information. "The Independent Advocate" is intended to be the mean of such information, and give to the people an honest, fair and correct account, of those whom they have, deservedly or undeservedly placed in power: but the Editor will not, to gratify the disappointed ambition or political hatred of those out of power, traduce those that are in, merely, that those that are out may get in. So long as those who are at the head of government shall in the great leading features of their administration, adhere to the Constitution and the rights of the People, as long will the "Independent Advocate" support them independently. Yet in all questions of political importance, this paper will be open to the judicious animadversions of others, who may differ with the Editor in his political views. There is a political, civil and commercial connexion between the North and South, that cannot be broken, but at the destruction of both. A spirit of rivalry, unless it be a rivalry to see which section can most promote the common weal, and sustain the fundamental principles of the government, should be deprecated. That compromising spirits which actuated the framers of the Constitution, should still be felt by their sons. All attempts to create jealousy between the different sections of the Union, shall be met by the Editor with due reprehension.

The Editor will not gag himself by begging Legislative patronage, nor lull his mind to sleep in the embraces of monied institutions, but men and measures shall be brought before the public bar, impartially but fearlessly; and all malversations in office, whether that office be a creature of the Constitution or of the Legislature, unconstitutionally created, shall, so far as they come to the Editor's knowledge, receive public exposure; but private character shall be held sacred and intangible. A proportion of this paper shall be devoted to the promotion of Agriculture, Domestic Economy and the Arts. The supporting pillar of all Free Governments, Public Education, will find in the Editor a zealous friend and promoter, and the lovers of Literature, shall be gratified in his selections, if not in his productions. That great and important work, Internal Improvement, which has so long kept Printers busy at their work, in this state, shall receive marked notice of the Editor. This paper shall be made as valuable to the Planters, the Farmers, and the Merchants, as a correct weekly report of the state of the Markets at home and abroad, will make it.

The first number will issue some time in next January, provided, always, that the subscription list will warrant it. The Advocate shall be printed on an imperial sheet, of the size of the "North Carolina Journal," and will be sent to Subscribers at Three dollars per annum one-half to be paid on the reception of the first number.
