For the Deaf & Dumb.
"THE New York Institution for
the instruction of the Deaf and Dumb,
is well organized and prepared to instruct
those who are deprived of hearing and
speech. The two instructors who can
hear and speak, (one male and one female,
are well qualified to teach the Deaf and
Dumb, having had eight years practical
experience. They are assisted by two
Mutes, one of each sex, who have been
taught in this Institution, and are highly
useful in the school. The system of
instruction pursued, is that of the French,
and the same as is pursued in other
schools, for the Deaf and Dumb in this
country. Pupils over eight, and not ex-
ceeding twenty-five years, will be received
at all times, for any period, at the
rate of 150 dollars a year, including
board and tuition, books and stationary,
washing, mending, and medical atten-
dance. There will be no extra charges;
but pupils are required to find their own
clothing and bedding. There is one vaca-
tion during the month of August, in
each year, when pupils may visit their
friends, or remain in the Institution, as
their option. The male and female pu-
pils are provided for in different buildings,
some distance apart, and are not allowed
to associate out of school.
