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

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following appropriations be, and the same are hereby made. and directed to be paid out of any money in the Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to enable the Secretary of the Treasury to provide by contract for building light houses, erecting beacons, and placing buoys, on the following sites and shoals, to wit : State of Maine : Five thousand dollars entrance of Lake Huron. for a light house on the most eligible site on

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#### **POST-OFFICE NEWBERN** FEBRUARY 20, 1829.

AN erroncous impression having been ge erally entertained among masters of vessels, that they are not required by law, to deliver into the Post-Office ali letters, (except those addressed tothe owner or consignee of their vessels) it is deem ed necessary in order to correct this error, to publish the following extracts from the Post-Office Law. A Steam-boat having been established to ply on the Neuse river, between this place and Beaufort, the river is heaceforth to be considered a post roug; and the packets which ply upon it, will hereafter to subject to the same recol as steam-boats, with regard to their letters. Extracts from the Post-Office Law. Sec. 6. And be it further enected, That it shall be the duty of every master or manager of any steam boat, which shall pass from one port or lace to another port or place in the U. States, where a Post Office is established, to deliver, within three hours after his arrival, if in the day time, and within two hours after the next sunrise, if the arrival be in the night, all letters and packets addressed to or destined for, such part or place, to the Postmaster there, for which he shall be entitled to receive of such Postmaster, two cents for every letter or packet so delivered, unless the same snall be carried or conveyed under contract with the Postmaster General: and, if my master or manager of a steam boat shall fail to deliver any letter or packet, which shall have been brought by him, or shall have been in his care, or within his power, he shall incur a penalty of thirty dollars for every such failure. And every person, employed on board any steam boat, shall deliver every, letter, and packet of letters, entrusted to such person, to the master or manager of such steam boat, and before the said vessel shall touch at any other port or place; and for every failure or neglect so to deliver, a penalty of ten dollars shall be incurred for each letter or packet. Sec. 15. And be if further endcled. That every etter or packet, brought into the United States, or carried from one port therein to unother, in any private ship or vessel, shall be charged with six cents, if delivered at the post office where the same shall arrive; and if destined to be conveyed; by post, to any place, with two cents added to. he ordinary rates of postage Sec. 17. And be it further enacted, That so ship or vessel, arriving at any port within the United States where a post office is established, shall be permitted to report, make entry, or bresk bulk, until the master or commander shall have delivered to the postmaster all letters directed to any person or persons within the United States. or the territories thereof, which under his care, or within his power, shall be brought in such ship or vessel, except such as are directed to the owner or consignee of the ship or vessel." And it shall be the duty of the collector, or other officer of the port empowered to receive entries of ships or vessels, to require, from every master or commander of such ship or vessel, an oath or affirmation, purporting that he has delivered all such letters, except as aforesaid ; and if any commander or master of any such ship or vessel shall break bulk before he shall have complied with the requirements of this act, every such affender shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit for every such offence, a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars. Sec. 19. And be it further enacted. That no stage, or other vehicle, which regularly performs trips on a post road, or on a road parallel to it, shall couvey letters; nor shall any packet boat or other vessel, which regularly plies on a water declared to be a post road, except such as relate to some part of the cargo. For the violation of this provision, the owner of the carriage, or other vehicle, or vessel, shall incur the penalty of fifty dollars. And the person who has charge of such carriage or other vehicle, or vessel, may be prosecuted under this section, and the property in his charge may be levied on and sold, in satisfaction of the penalty, and costs of suit : Provided; That it shall be lawful for any one to send letters by special messenger. 67 71
