BY AUTHORITY.

Laws of the United States, passed at the
Second Session of the 19th Congress.

An act for the relief of the indigent sufferers by
the fire at Alexandria.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Repre-
sentatives of the United States of America in Con-
gress assembled, That the sum of twenty thousand
dollars be, and the same is hereby appropriated,
to be paid out of any money in the Treasury not
otherwise appropriated, for the relief of the in-
digent sufferers by the destructive fire in the ci-
ty of Alexandria, in the District of Columbia, to
be distributed under the direction of the Mayor
and Common Council of the City of Alexandria,
for the immediate relief of such class of sufferers
and for no other purpose.

Approved—24th Jan. 1827.

An act to provide for taking evidence in the
Courts of the United States, in certain cases.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Repre-
sentatives of the United States of America in Con-
gress assembled, That whenever a Commission
shall be issued, by any Court of the United States
for taking the testimony of a witness or witnesses,
at any place within the U. States, or the territories
thereof, it shall be lawful for the Clerk of any Court
of the United States, for the District or Territo-
ry within which such place may be, and he is
hereby enjoined and required, upon the applica-
tion of either of the parties in the suit, cause,
action, or proceeding, in which such Commission
shall have been issued, his, her, or their agent
or agents, to issue a subpoena or subpoenas, for
each witness or witnesses, residing or being with-
in the said District or Territory, as shall be nam-
ed in the said Commission, commanding such
witness or witnesses to appear and testify before
the Commissioner or Commissioners, in such
Commission named, at a time and place in the
subpoena to be stated, and if any witness, after
being duly served with such subpoena, shall re-
fuse or neglect to appear, or, after appearing,
shall refuse to testify (not being privileged from
giving testimony) such refusal or neglect being
proved to the satisfaction of any Judge of the
Court, whose Clerk shall have issued such sub-
poena or subpoenas, he may thereupon proceed
to enforce obedience to the process, or to punish
the disobedient, in like manner as any Court of
the United States may do in case of disobedience
to process of subpoena ad testificandum, issued
by such Court; and the witness or witnesses in
such cases, shall be allowed the same compensa-
tion as is allowed to witnesses attending the
Courts of the United States: Provided, that no
witness shall be required to attend at any place
out of the county in which he may reside, nor
more than forty miles from his place of residence,
to give his or her deposition under this law.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That when-
ever either of the parties in such suit, cause,
action, or proceeding, shall apply to any Judge of
a Court of the United States, in the District or Ter-
ritory of the United States, in which the place
for taking such testimony may be for a subpoena
duces tecum, commanding the witness, therein to
be named, to appear and testify before said Com-
missioner or Commissioners, at the time and place
in the said subpoena to be stated, and also to
bring or carry with him or her, and produce to
such Commissioner or Commissioners, a paper,
writing, or written instrument, or book, or
other documents supposed to be in the posses-
sion or power of such witness, such Judge being
satisfied, by the affidavit of the person apply-
ing, or otherwise, that there is reason to be-
lieve that such paper, writing, written instru-
ment, book, or other document, is in the posses-
sion or power of the witness, and that the same,
if produced, would be competent and material
evidence for the party applying therefor, may or-
der the Clerk of the Court, of which he is a
Judge, to issue such subpoena duces tecum accord-
ingly, and if such witness, after being duly
served with such subpoena duces tecum, shall
fail to produce any such paper, writing, written
instrument, book, or other document, being in
the possession or power of such witness, and de-
scribed in such subpoena duces tecum, before, and
to such Commissioner or Commissioners, at the
time and place in such subpoena stated, such
failure being proved to the satisfaction of the
said Judge, he may proceed to enforce obedi-
ence to the said process of subpoena duces tecum,
or to punish the disobedient, in like manner as
any Court of the United States may do in case of
disobedience to a like process, issued by such
Court; and when any such paper, writing, written
instrument, book or other document, shall be
produced to such Commissioner or Commis-
sioners, he or they shall at the cost of the party
requiring the same, cause to be made a fair and
correct copy thereof, or of so much thereof as
shall be required by either of the parties: Pro-
vided, that no witness shall be deemed guilty of
contempt for disobeying any subpoena directed
to him by virtue of this act, unless his fees for go-
ing to, returning from and one day's attendance
at the place of examination, shall be paid or ten-
dered to him at the time of the service of the
subpoena.

Approved: 24th Jan. 1827.

An act concerning the selection of certain lands
heretofore granted by compact, to the State
of Missouri, for Seminars of Learning.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Repre-
sentatives of the United States of America in Con-
gress assembled, That it shall be the duty of the
President of the United States, as soon as may be,
to cause to be selected, from any of the public lands
of the United States in Missouri, the sale of which

is authorized by law, & in quantities not less than
a section, according to the divisional lines of the
public surveys, the several townships of land
heretofore secured by compact to the State, of
Missouri, for the purposes of a seminary or semi-
naries of learning in that State, and to cause one
descriptive list of such selections to be filed with
the Governor of Missouri, in the office of the
Secretary of that State; and another like list to be
filed in the General Land-Office of the United
States; and the lands so selected shall, immedi-
ately thereupon, vest in the State of Missouri, ac-
cording to, and in satisfaction of, the above-men-
tioned compact of the United States.

Approved: 24th Jan. 1827.

Resolution directing the Secretary of the Navy
to apply to the Government of Pennsylvania
for jurisdiction over certain lands of the Navy
Yard, Philadelphia.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Repre-
sentatives of the United States of America in Con-
gress assembled, That the Secretary of the Navy
be directed to request the Government of the
State of Pennsylvania to cede to the United States
jurisdiction over such lands as are owned by the
United States, and improved for public purposes,
at the Navy Yard at Philadelphia.

Approved: 24th Jan. 1827.

An enterprising individual is likely to do
more in the way of Canal Navigation, than all
the public bodies in the vicinity of New
Orleans. On the right bank of the Missis-
sippi, nearly opposite our lower suburbs, a
canal has been cut from the Mississippi to
a bayou emptying into lake Barataria.—
There is a flood gate on the margin of the
river, and we believe another on the edge
of the swamp. Boats or barges, not ex-
ceeding twelve feet in breadth of beam,
when this canal is finished next spring,
may proceed from New-Orleans to any part
of Lafourch, Attakapas, or Opeleousas, &
that without encountering the current of the
Mississippi, or the dangers of the Gulf.
