Dr. Von Iffland, in his writings, relates a very extraordinary case of the sagacity a Newfoundland Dog. The Doctor ob erves :- " While in practice at Quebec, a large dog, bleeding profusely from the right leg, attracted the attention of one of my students :-- by stroking the dog on the head and back, he was coaxed into the surgery, where, on examination, I found an artery and the tendons completely divided. I ordered the poor animal to be firmly secured, by which means a ligature was applied to the bleeding vessel, and after shaving the hair surrounding the wound, I brought its edges together (leaving a small perture for the ligature.) covered with linen bandage. After the operation, he was set at liberty; but to my great surprise, the following morning the dog was one of my earliest patients—the bandage appeared to be undisturbed; I, however, emoved it for the purpose, of examining the state of the wound, and as the strips of ers seemed to be in the adhesive state had applied them the day before, they were allowed to remain. On the third day about the same hour, the sagacious animal made his appearance—he was then of course considered by me as an out-door patient, incognita. and impatiently (by his gestures) waited his turn to meet the attention of my assistants to dress anew his wounds. fo which he most gently submitted, licking, during the whole time of the operation, the hands of the operator. A gamekeeper named Barnavon, was found at three o'. clock in the afternoon, on the 10th of Aug. wounded in the most shocking manner; the unfortunate man had received eight stabs in different parts of the body and a violent blow on the head which had fractured his skull: he was carried to his dwelling, and in presence of his wife and chrildren made the following statement: - "Two neighbors my assistance in preventing a miller named Audran from turning the course of a stream which belonged to them : after settling this business I returned homewards, when passcarefully applied adhesive plasters, and ing near a narrow road, Audran sprang from behind a hedge and felled me to the earth with a bludgeon; whilst lying senseless upon the ground, the murderer stabbed me in the bosom; the pain caused by the second blow brought me to a sense of my dreadful situation, and rising on my knees I said, "Audran, take pity on my poor family and do not kill me !" My prayer into the presence of the dying man, who gave the above evidence. "But where did I commit the crime ?" said Audran .-" Near the wall of a garden belonging to Mr. Louis, was the reply." Immediately after uttering these words, the wounded man expired. The police repaired to the place that was indicated; no marks of blood were to be found; but the confession of Barnavon, added to the circumstance of a coat which Audran wore on the day of the murder not being discovered, was deemed sufficient evidence; the Jury found the prisoner guilty, and was sentenced to deliverable at the several Navy Yards aforesaid. death.
